A FEW FARM NOTES

Eugene, Oregon, will hold its annual poultry and pet stock show Dec. 14, 15, 16, 1899.

The food cost of raising chickens was found to be about five cents per pound live weight at the Ontario Agricultural College last year.

The Fruitman's Guide estimates that Germany will this year take 100,000 barrels of American apples against 22,861 barrels last year.

If every farmer in the land would begin at once to breed pure bred fowls, the value of the poultry products of this country would be at least doubled.

There are over 3,000 head of beef cattle awaiting shipment to San Francisco at Gazelle and Montague. Freight cars are now in big demand everywhere.

The scraps of butchering time are worth about as much as anything about the hog; boil them up and dole them out to the hens. It will quickly set them to singing.

T. S. Townsend, of Portland, is talking of establishing a creamery at Woodburn, Oregon, and will put one in if the milk from a sufficient number of cows can be assured.

It is an item in selecting and purchasing a flock of sheep to feed and put on the market to have all of the same breed, size and color. This can only be done by using pure bred sires.

The inflow of pedigreed stock of all kinds into the Pacific Northwest which has been a marked feature of late promises continued prosperity for the stock farmers of this region in the future.

The Pacific Rural Press says the prune market in California shows

weakness, with slow movement. Buyers have reduced their bids a quarter to half a cent on all but small sizes.

Beans are high this year. There are a few farmers in eastern Oregon and Idaho who make a specialty of raising beans. If they secured a fair crop this year, it will be a profitable one for them.

F. W. Hitchcock, of Denver, Col., has been secured to act as judge of the Oregon State Poultry Show. He is a prominent breeder of fancy poultry and has a national reputation as a judge.

The Myrtle Creek correspondent of the Roseburg Review says 18 carloads of prunes have been shipped so far this season from Myrtle Creek and that about 20 carloads remain yet to be shipped.

From items in the Roseburg Review it appears that Edwin Weaver of Myrtle Creek had a little over 200,000 pounds of cured prunes; John Weaver, 47,000 pounds and J. B. Harris, 36,000 pounds.

A squash which weighed 345 pounds was exhibited this fall at the National Export Exposition. The squash was grown by C. D. Riker of Newburgh, N. Y. The exhibition management paid him \$500 for it.

The next annual show of the poultry association at Eugene, Oregon, will be held December 14, 15 and 16. Entries will close December 13 at 10 p. m. The association invites a poultryman to be present and enter their fowls.

War between Great Britain and the Transvaal colony, is quite likely to affect the prices of mohair, and to stop the occasional importation of Angora goats from South Africa. The commerce in ostrich plumes is likely to be similarly affected.

Oregon can beat the world in producing a high grade sheep both for mutton and wool, and if our farmers will stick close to producing that which we excel in they will always have the whole world for a market, for the best is always bound to sell first.

The time of holding the annual meetings of state horticultural societies, dairy associations and other similar organizations is now near. The educational value of these meetings is not appreciated by many who would be benefited by attending them. All meetings of this kind ought to be attended by every farmer who can reach them.

There is going to be a small sized spring exhibition at Houston hall in this city tonight, under the management of the Scio Athletic club. A small admission of 10 cents will be charged and the proceeds will be used in fitting up a hall for the use of the club. All are invited to attend, and help the boys.

The report has gained credence that the people living in the Pioneer neighborhood has been exposed to the smallpox, but Mr. Pomroy

was in Scio yesterday and stated that he nor none of his people had been exposed to the disease, nor even any of the people living on that side of the mountain. There is a few cases in a mild form a few miles from them, but they are keeping to themselves, and the danger of spread is about over.

A new time table has been put into effect on the Woodburn-Natron branch of the S. P. railroad, which brings the evening train into West Scio at 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon instead of 5:40 as heretofore. The change is greatly appreciated by our citizens, as it gives us the Portland mail about half past three instead of after supper. A change has also gone into effect on the C. & E. which brings that train into Munger forty minutes earlier than before.

We wish to call the attention of property owners who have shade trees in front of their property to the condition of the shade walks under the branches of those trees. The walks as a rule are covered with decayed leaves, and navigation is thus made very difficult. It would not require very much labor to sweep off the walk two or three times a week until after the leaves have all fallen, and this should not only be done for the safety of pedestrians but also for the benefit of the walk itself. The decayed leaves cause the walk to rot out in a short time.

Rumors has it that the U. S. grand jury has found indictments against about twenty persons who have located homesteads in the timber belt on upper and middle creeks. Just what the change is no one seems to know, but the chances are that there will be some vacant land up there now pretty soon. During the past summer there has been a man locating claims up there, and he has gone to a good deal of expense in constructing a good trail in to the best timber localities, and in all about fifty claims have been located, principally by Albany people, and the indictments are probably the outgrowth of these locations.

Lebanon and Jefferson are following in the footsteps of Scio, and are establishing a strict quarantine against the disease known as smallpox. It is a pretty hard thing to do, but there is no help for it, or other safe method to pursue. Those who know that they have been exposed to the disease should keep away from others, and thus assist in keeping down the spread of the disease. On the contrary, however, people seem to take a delight in traveling about and telling about being exposed and seeing those who were sick. It is this fact that makes it necessary for cities to quarantine against all persons coming from a community where the disease is known to exist.
