The president's message to con-
gress shows careful preparation and
a strong determination to take ag-
gressive action in the Philippine
matter and the currency question.
The gold standard will undoubtedly
be enacted into law by this congress.

The fifty sixth congress of the
United States convened on Monday
of last week, and the indications
are that a great deal of valuable
work will be done. There is no
doubt that the session will be a
success, and the results will be
congratulated by the whole country.
The rebellion, all of which will be met fearlessly
and efficiently. In the senate there
is a republican majority of sixteen
and in the house there are eighteen
majority.

are hopeless and helpless, having
exhausted all their powers to
influence the little rebel to longer hang on. It's pretty time now to
take surrendered appeal for mercy.

International arbitration is not so
new idea as some suppose. There
was a difference between 1837
and 1888 congress has entertained
petitions and memorials on the
subject from peace societies and
bodies of citizens in New England,
New York and Virginia. Even the
czar's proposal for a congress of nations
in the interest of peace was anticipated by resolutions
adopted by the legislature of
Massachusetts, in 1844, and similar
action was taken by the legislature
of Vermont in 1853. Dr. Franklin's
ardent wish that the nations of the
earth might have a method of settling
disputes by cutting each other's
throats must have been cherished
by many friends of humanity long
before his day.
