## BY THE EDITOR

On account of several expected changes in the boundaries of the voting precincts voters are requested not to register before the 15th of the month, when it is thought everything will be ready.

The records of the rainfall during the year 1899, as kept by Mr. F. M. French at Albany shows that July was the driest month with only .03 of an inch and November the wettest with 8.77 inches. The total for the year was 46.63 inches, and shows a monthly average of 3.89 inches.

The New Year's Edition of The Albany Herald is a fine publication. It is neatly printed on fine paper and profusely illustrated with fine engravings made from photographs. Among the portraits are to be found several prominent Scio business men and a neatly worded and quite comprehensive write up of the town, its business and some of its prospects and prosperity. ## Wasted Things.

"There is being so much said in the country about hard times and the scarcity of money, and as everybody has a cause and knows a remedy, I thought I would write to tell your readers what I think is the cause," says a writer in the American Times, who appears to be familiar with the waste. "We buy more than we produce. There is too much flour and bacon shipped here every year. The things we ought to make at home are being shipped. We get our timber and buy our plow stock, singletrees, axe-handles, hoe-handles and fencing. We throw away our ashes and buy soap and kerosene. We give away our beads and buy hamm-strings and shoe laces. We waste our manure and buy guano. We buy garden seed in the spring and cabbage in the winter. We let our lands grow up in weeds and buy our beans. We waste the wax out of our pine and gum trees and buy chewing gum for our children. We build schoolhouses and hire teachers and send our children off to be educated. We land a great fish with a 4-dollar rod. We send a 1-cent boy out with a 20-dollar gun and a 4-dollar dog to kill birds. We raise dogs and buy wool. And about the only things in this country that there is an over-production of are politics and dog ticks."

While the above is written in a somewhat humorous vein, it contains many solid facts, that it would be largely to the betterment of the people of this country if they would heed and seek to remedy. Many things are brought into Oregon that it requires good money to buy. After they are here we have them; but our money is gone; and when money ceases to circulate in a state or community then begins a cramp in business affairs. Oregon produces the wood to make almost anything needed, and iron in the raw material is cheap. The state needs factories that will take this raw material and make it into things needed at home. And the day will come when this will be done and then will we have continued better times.

## Must Multitate Stamps.

A ruling that went into effect recently regarding the cancellation of revenue stamps appears to be a good thing for the stationers. A business man will either have to buy a canceling machine or go to a manual training school to acquire the skill necessary legally to multitate the stamps. All revenue stamps of the denomination of ten cents or over must be multitated according to this regulation ordered by the commissioner of internal revenue, as follows:

"In all cases where a documentary stamp of the denomination of 10 cents or any larger denomination shall be used for denoting any tax liability, the stamp of June 13, 1898, the person using the same shall, in addition to writing or stamping thereon, with ink, the initials of his name and the date when affixed, multitate said stamp by cutting three parallel incisions, lengthwise through the stamp, beginning not more than one-fourth of an inch from one end thereof and extending to within one-fourth of an inch of the other end. Where such stamp is cancelled by cutting or perforating in any manner authorized by existing regulations, as aforesaid, the multitation herein provided shall not be required. This provision shall take effect and be in force on and after December 15."

## The Teachers

The western district teachers association, which has been in session several days at Salem, adjourned Friday evening, a successful and entertaining session. This forenoon officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows:

Albany was selected as the place for meeting next year.  
In the department of superintendents of counties, Prof. McDonald of this county was elected president. E. V. Littlefield vice president, and C. L. Gilbert secretary. Several sessions were held and important subjects discussed. Prof. McDonald leading the discussion on high schools for rural districts.

The yield of \$2,130,000 in the Cripple Creek gold field in November, making a total of \$15,700,000 for the eleven months, which will be increased to \$18,000,000 by the close of December, shows that leadily to be the richest gold producing district yet developed in the United States. There has been a steady increase in the output of Cripple Creek mines in recent years, and at the present time they are far richer than those of the Klondike region. There is a fair probability that the Cape Nome diggings may exceed in richness those of the Colorado field. At any rate this country is likely to be near the head of the gold producing countries in 1900, even though work be resumed in the South African fields by that time.

Altago, one of Altamonts best sons owned by McKnight Brothers of this county, died a few days ago at their farm near Tallman, at the age of 16 years. He was the sire of some of Oregon's best trotters, Flora G. with a record of 2:21, Hugo 2:22 and others nearly as good, six or seven under 3:30.

## DonaDon Must Pay.

Judge Burnett held an adjourned term of the first department of the circuit court in the records office at Albany Friday afternoon and rendered his decision in the two cases against P. G. Morris and his bondsmen for about \$3,800 alleged to have been embezzled by him as treasurer of Linn county. The court held that there being no direct evidence was the presumption that in the first case the \$1845.36 supposed to be short that term was turned to his successor at the end of the term and hence rendered judgment for only \$289.04 and interest against the treasurer and his bondsmen for that term, L. F. Finn, J. W. Cusick, P. Cohen, A. B. Griggs, A. G. Marshall, W. A. Paul, S. E. Young, Wm. Fisher and P. H. Marshall, and \$3,410.80 and interest against the bondsmen of the second term, J. W. Cusick, A. B. Griggs, P. B. Marshall, L. Finn, S. E. Young and A. G. Marshall. The total judgment will be for \$483.74 on the first term case and \$3,741.35 on the second term case. Total \$4,225.09. The defendants attorney gave notice of appeal to the supreme court.
