It is reported that 30,000 tickets have been engaged for transportation from Seattle to Nome, Alaska, on vessels leaving in May and June. It is impossible to reach there now by water, owing to the ice, and the overland route requires a journey of 1000 miles over the frozen snow and ice. However many are going in on this route, and when the travel by water opens up Nome will soon be a large city.

Our people should feel proud of the work, and doubtless ever tax payer does feel proud of it, and the county officers should be congratulated upon their good work.

The Albany city council at a regular meeting held in that city this week decided to post notices on the big steel bridge and have some published notifying the public that the bridge was unsafe for travel and that the city would not be responsible for accidents. The move was made for the purpose of shifting the blame onto the county. The city went into debt about \$100,000 for the construction of the bridge, and now they intend to compel the county to keep it in repair. For several years past there has been a desire on the part of a number of citizens of Albany to force the bridge onto the county, but as at least ninety per cent of the benefit to be derived from the bridge goes to Albany and her people it is no more than right that the city should keep it in repair. The matter will doubtless form a small sized figure in the coming county campaign.

Too many fail to perceive that with the practice of economy when an employe, a youth can shortly place himself, even at first on a small scale, in the position of employer. If him pursue the same course as John B. McDonald, be honest, industrious and thoroughly reliable, and he will become independent.—Woodburn Independent.
