Gen. Shafter's assertion that the Insurrection in the Philippines is practically ended agrees with the opinions of all the military chiefs in the Islands whose views have reached the public. This idea seems reasonable. There has been no fighting for the past five or six weeks except of the guerrilla order. Aguinaldo has disappeared so completely that there are rumors that he has escaped from the island and is somewhere on the mainland of Asia. All the leading fighting men on the rebel side have either been killed in battle with the Americans, or have been assassinated by order of Aguinaldo. Virtually all the heads of the so-called civil government of the Philippines are in American hands as prisoners, some of whom gave themselves up voluntarily. Most of the Philippine ports, closed since the Spanish war days, have been thrown open to the commerce of the world in the past three or four weeks. Technically, the rebellion in the Islands is still "on," but no body looks for any serious fighting hereafter. Judge Taft's civil commission will have the whole field to itself when it goes to the Philippines.

The name of C. A. Wanted to Escape.

Sheriff Mankers discovered Monday evening that the three prisoners in the jail, J. W. Thompson and Ben Farrell, awaiting the action of the circuit court, and Bert Barkhart on a month's sentence had begun arrangements to escape. By complaining they had secured extra food which had been hid in blankets, and had had back a knife which after considerable of a search was found in a water pipe covered with bread. Thompson had also left the dishes so that the sheriff had to stoop to pick them up evidently intending mischief. As it was the vigilance of the sheriff stopped proceedings before anything had been done. The prisoners will be kept close now to pay for their misdeeds.

More Cows Less Wheat.

In his address before the Farmer's Congress, Geo. L. Ross, manager of the Albany treasury, gave figures to show that it takes \$404.30 to produce \$1000 worth of wheat, figuring 100 acres of land at \$30 an acre, and wheat at 50 cents a bushel; production, twenty bushels to the acre; while twenty-five cows on fifty acres of land, representing an investment of \$488.50, will produce \$1900 worth of dairy products, to say nothing of improving the land, instead of wearing it out.

A FEW FARM NOTES

J. W. Grant, of Yamhill county, Oregon, recently received a couple of Poland China pigs from Missouri. The express charges on them were \$12.00.

The Dallas Itemizer reports that W. B. Stevens, of Polk county, Oregon, recently sold 12 head of Short-horn steers averaging 1235 pounds each in weight to a Salem butcher for \$997.

It is claimed that an animal will starve to death if fed no potato, and yet for too many of us fail to study the feeding question as we should. Are we feeding stock and at the same time starving them?

Have you noticed that one axle on the wagon will run dry before the other three and it will need some watching? It may be improved by placing a large leather washer on it, so that it will last a long time.

Australians are fast overcropping the rabbit nuisance in that country, which is next to drouth in its evil effects. They are canned and shipped to London and Paris, the latter city consuming ten millions per year and Great Britain seventy millions.

It is the hard places in life that make people successful. It is labor that makes rest so sweet, and it is the hard work that makes life an enjoyment. If everything went just as he wanted it a decade would not pass until we would be a ruined people.

Don't place too much stress on the color of pedigree of the calf. The pedigree speaks for the offspring, but the animal must speak for itself. The man is what he is and not what his grandfather was. It is well enough to have a good grandfather, and to dig the eyes out of potatoes, pulling the ears from corn, eating the head of cabbage, pulling the beets out of rye, throwing wheat, cutting the heart of a tree, spilling the blood of the goat, tearing skin off the peach, breaking the neck of the squash and other outrages.

We are in favor of a society for the prevention of cruelty to vegetables as an exchange. Just think of digging the eyes out of potatoes, pulling the ears from corn, eating the head of cabbage, pulling the beets out of rye, throwing wheat, cutting the heart of a tree, spilling the blood of the goat, tearing skin off the peach, breaking the neck of the squash and other outrages.

Make a few bushel boxes out of box lumber and see how hardy they will be during the year, and perhaps next winter several more will be made. If for handling potatoes or apples they may be made of staves. These can be tied up in the cellar and the air will circulate between the crates and the contents will keep much better. They are excellent for keeping most kind of vegetables.

A premium of \$150 will be paid this year at the Oregon State Fair for the best display of farm animals consisting of not less than two horses, five cattle, five sheep, five Angora goats, and five swine. Mr. E. Stump, of Monmouth, contributed \$50 towards this premium, and if he competes for it he will show a lot of blooded stock that any farmer in any state of the Union might be proud of.

The importance of the live stock industry in Morrow county, Oregon, may be inferred from the fact that there was shipped from its county 200,000 pounds of wool, 220,000 pounds of mutton and 175,000 pounds of sheep. A large number of sheep were also driven out of the county. The Heppner Gazette places the number of surplus sheep for sale in the county this year at 175,000. For the week ending Feb. 23, the Gazette reports sales amounting to about 10,000 head, nearly all at \$2.50 per head for yearlings delivered after shearing. Buyers are ready to take more on that basis, but growers want to hold their own, and buyers are offering only \$2.25 for yearling weathers.

He was a gunsmith by trade. He had been a member of the United Presbyterian church for nearly fifty years and lived a consistent Christian life. He was the second of a family of eight children.

The scalp bounty law as acted by the last legislature is meeting with dissatisfaction by nearly all the counties of the Willamette Valley. Multnomah county has refused to levy the tax. The ten stock counties are Baker, Crook, Grant, Harney, Lake, Malheur, Gilliam, Wasco, Wheeler and Wheeler. Their taxable property is valued at \$21,244,044. The ten counties having but few sheep and goats, are Clatskanie, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Washington, and Yamhill. The value of their taxable property is \$76,073,388. A levy of one-fourth of a mill upon their property would net \$19,017; with Multnomah out \$11,193. The stock counties will contribute \$4075 and the remainder must be raised in all other counties which have made the levy. Benton county has 17,024 sheep and goats, with a total value of \$33,495. The value of her taxable property is \$2,625,272. Her contribution to the scalp bounty tax would be \$662.25. Crook county possesses 175,994 of those animals, whose value is \$268,323. Her total taxable property amounts to only \$1,715,789, and she contributes only \$427 to the bounty fund.
