Have you registered?

Candidates are beginning to get their war paint on, and within a short time they will be out among the voters in a campaign extending over a long period, and "digging up" 15(7) cent cigars.

Nearly every voter in the two Seaside precincts has registered. How about the others. In some precincts there are a large number yet to register, and the time in which to prepare yourself for the coming two elections is becoming short. Better attend to the matter sooner.

By glancing over our advertising columns you will find the Democratic-People's, and Republican tickets, placed there at the instances of the county central committees, in order that the voters who chance to read this paper might know who the candidates of these parties are, that they may judge of their ability and fitness for the position sought.

In our political column this week appears the card of Hon. H. M. Palmer, union candidate for the office of county judge. Mr. Palmer resides on a farm five miles southwest of Albany, where he has resided since coming to this county nine years ago from Nebraska. Two years ago he was elected representative from this county to the state legislature, and there made a record of no other member of the house of representatives. According to the Salem Journal's record Mr. Palmer voted right and for the interest of the people whom he was representing more times than any other member. He was always on hand and ever ready to meet any question which might be presented that was not for the best interests of the people. Mr. Palmer is 51 years of age, and has held several minor offices of trust before coming to this county. He was nominated without solicitation, and without a moment's notice, and if elected will doubtless fill the office with credit to the county as well as himself.

The political announcement of W. F. Hammer, democratic people's candidate for the office of county clerk, appears in this issue. Mr. Hammer has been a resident of Albany for the past 18 years, and has held numerous positions of trust and responsibility during that period. He was nominated for county clerk on the populist ticket six years ago, and although he was defeated he polled a very large vote. His defeat at that time was owing to the fact that the entire republican ticket was elected. He is a very popular young man of much ability, and one in whom all have the greatest faith. He is a good business man, and thoroughly qualified to fill the position to which he aspires. His nomination was almost by the unanimous vote of the convention, and was made so upon motion of his opponent before the convention. Should he be successful in being elected, he will doubtless handle the affairs of the county in a business-like manner, and to the thorough satisfaction of every voter of the county. During his campaign six years ago there was not a single utterance made against him or his ability to properly conduct the affairs of the county.

In another column will be found a short article from the pen of E. E. Larimore, manager of the fiber company of this city, which pertains to flax and flax culture, and should interest those of our farmers who grow flax. Mr. Larimore will have an article each week on this same subject, and we trust that all will become more interested in the industry as the proper culture of flax means a good many dollars to the farmers, and the establishment of an enterprise of great magnitude within the borders of our city. There is no experiment to be made. This stage has been past, and the fact demonstrated that there is good money to be made by raising flax. Of course

many lost money last year, but they also lost on all cereal crops, and last year must not be taken into consideration in estimating the value of flax culture. The farmers of this vicinity should all do what they can to help out the industry, as the fiber company cannot do anything unless the farmers raise the straw upon which they can work. If you do not feel like devoting a large tract to this cereal put in a few acres and try it and see if you cannot make more money with it than you can in raising other crops at the present low values. The fiber company have spent a large amount of money in this city during the past year, and merit and should receive the undivided support of every resident of this section, not the business man alone, but the farmer, who is to receive the first and greatest benefits to be derived by the establishment of the fiber plant in this locality.

Death of Thomas Kay

Thomas Kay, the pioneer wooden mill man of Oregon, died in St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, Friday of last week, from the effects of an operation for Bright's disease of the kidneys, performed over a week before. Thomas Kay was born in Yorkshire, near Leeds, England, in 1838. He came to the United States in 1857 and to Oregon in 1863. He was married to Miss Anne Slingsted in 1857. They had seven children. Mr. Kay was superintendent of the Brownsville wooden mill for many years, several years ago going to Salem and building the mill at that city, which prospered under his management. He was a shrewd man, well liked by all knowing him. His death is not only a loss to his family and Salem but the entire state.

A FEW FARM NOTES

Rape is the greatest forage plant for sheep, pigs and calves known to modern husbandry. It is rich, succulent and very nutritious, and produces three or four times as much green food to the acre as any other grazing crop. For ewes and suckling lambs, and especially for weaning lambs it has no equal.

Strain a fruit jar full of milk through the strainer which you use constantly and if there is any sediment in the bottom of the jar after it has stood a few hours you will know that you have not yet learned to strain milk. You may astonish yourself. One of the first and chief principles of dairy is cleanliness.

A progressive farmer has reported that his sows farrowed twice a year bringing an average of 11 pig to the litter. He sold his pigs at nine months and his sales footed up to \$300 a year. No fault can be found with such farming, and it will pay more profit to the acre than any crop sold direct would bring, especially wheat at 50 cents a bushel.

The Oregon State Fair will be a hummer this year and every breeder in the Northwest should be represented there. There is no better place to introduce your stock to the buying public than at a state fair. Hundreds of people attend these fairs annually for the purpose of selecting breeding stock and the breeder who makes an exhibit gets the cream of the trade.

Henry Bateman has a half-dozen half blood O. I. C. pigs at his farm northeast of town, which are now about 90 days old, that are something in the hog line that are hard to beat. The six pigs will average 33 pounds each. The mother is a full-blood Poland China, the father being a registered hog which Mr. Bateman purchased in the East last year. Hog farmers should see these pigs.—Brownsville Times.
