As It Should Be

The casual observer, who seeks to become acquainted with the flax situation, soon finds himself in a predicament where doctors disagree. One expert (?) tells us that flax is a severe drain upon the land where it is grown, another, that it is not. One says the flax plant is delicate; the other, that it is hardly less so. It should be sown late, the other, that it should be sown early. The one that much seed should be sown per acre; the other, that little should be sown. This difference of opinion applied to almost every part of the process, soon leads the inquirer to the conclusion, that what remains to be discovered about flax, would make a volume of considerable dimensions, and he begins to wonder if any or all of these points are vital to the propagation of an industry which shall utilize some of the millions of tons of flax straw that are annually destroyed in the United States.

While it is but reasonable to admit that there is a wrong, and a right to everything, yet there is little doubt that many lose sight of the main object at stake in the too great attention paid to the details that should properly follow rather than proceed the practical demonstration of the possibilities, and they may one day awake to find the baby grown to man's estate, before they have settled on a suitable cognomen.

When you have investigated and studied the literature of a past age, and consulted with a half a hundred people who have heard their grandmothers say that things were "that" you will be nearly ready to believe the world has thrown over the reversing lever, and is going the other way, and unless your nerve is good, you'll probably give up trying to discover something that was discovered four thousand years ago.

A thing which this age calls a new discovery cannot have many barometers clinging to it, and our friends who spend their time over trifles are about to discover that a discovery has been made. The results of all this is to be that the same old "worthless straw" is going to be utilized, and in a manner that shall eventually revolutionize the textile industry; and whether it was weak or strong, now thick or thin, early or late, it will all go the same way and a great many dollars worth of it will find its way to the counters of our land, where it will replace that which gives our American laborers no wages, and compels the farmers to lose the best product of their labor. When American production shall control the American linen market, we shall witness the spectacle of American seedlings in the textile mills, and America, now the home of foreign linens must surrender to American enterprise and brains.
