In another column will be found the card of Judge J. J. Whitney, union nominee for representative. Mr. Whitney is not a beginner in the art of politics, but has been before the people of Linn county a number of times, and each time and in each capacity he gave the best of satisfaction in whatever capacity he was serving the people. He was elected representative from this county two years ago, and is too well known throughout the county to need a lengthy introduction from us. He is simply qualified to fill the position with honor to his constituents, and it is felt without doubt that his duty is a fearless and honorably manner.

The political announcement of Frank J. Miller, republican candidate for representative, appears in this issue. Mr. Miller is by no means a stranger to the people of Linn county. He has been a resident of Albany since 1875, and for a number of years was connected with the O. P. railroad as bridge constructor, and filled a like position for Linn county, he having been the builder of the county bridge at Lebanon, as well as other bridges in the county. He is now interested in the Albany Iron works, and intends making his permanent home in Albany. He has never been before the people in the capacity of an office seeker and was placed in nomination for representative by his friends who had known him for a number of years, and were able to judge of his fitness for the position.

The card of M. D. Phillips, of Albany, republican nominee for the office of sheriff of Linn county, appears in this issue. Mr. Phillips is a young man of much business ability, and is well known throughout the entire county. He was engaged in business for a number of years prior to the recent war, when he went out in defense of his country at the head of Company L, and in which capacity he remained at the front in the Philippines and was ever ready to do his duty as a soldier and as a man. Captain Phillips is not a politician or even an office seeker. He was put forward for the office of sheriff by his numerous friends received the nomination by the unanimous vote of the convention. Should he be elected to the office he will doubtless serve the people well and honorably.

G. L. Rees, republican nominee for representative has placed his political announcement in our columns this week. Mr. Rees resides on a farm four miles west of Albany, where he is actively engaged in dairying and fancy stock raising. He is vice president of the Albany Creamery association, and has always taken a great interest in trying to assist in the upbuilding of the stock and dairying interests of the county. He is a member of the state board of agriculture, which position gives him an opportunity to show to the people what can be done along the line of dairying and fancy stock raising. He is a member of the grand jury, and has been foremost in working for the interests of the farmers and laboring classes. He is a man 38 years of age, and this is his first attempt at seeking office, and should he be successful he will doubtless serve the people of his county in an honorable and satisfactory manner.

The card of Hon. A. J. Jeffrey, union nominee for the office of district attorney appears in this issue of THE NEWS. Mr. Jeffrey is now a practicing attorney of Salem, where he has been located for the past two years, going there from Jackson county, where he was raised from childhood. He is a young man of much legal ability, and was elected one of the representatives from that county in 1894, and in 1896 he was elected district attorney which office he filled for two years with much credit to all concerned. While in this office he had a large number of cases before him, and there are now several persons serving sentences in servitude as a result of his vigorous labors in the interest of justice. Should Mr. Jeffrey be elected to the position of district attorney he will doubtless fill the office with equal satisfaction and credit to all as he did in the first district, and promises to look well to the interests of the taxpayers of the county over which he has jurisdiction.

The political card of W. L. Jackson, union candidate for county superintendent of schools, appears in this issue. Mr. Jackson comes before the people for one of the most important offices within the gift of the people, as it is one which affects the education of the children of the county, and fits them for the battles of life. He is a young man, being but 27 years of age, but at the same time he has had several years' experience in the educational field. He has been in this state for the past 23 years, and 12 years of that time has been spent in teaching in this county. He was principal of the Brownsville public school for three years, and has had charge of the largest schools for the past two years. He is a member of the county examining board, and has taken special training in school work in all its branches. He is also a member of the local teachers' institute of Albany, which gives him many advantages in the different lines of school work. If elected he signifies a desire to give his whole time to the business of the county and to their best interest.

The following from The Oregonian explains why country made butter is low in price, and is another evidence of the popularity of creameries and creamery butter.

"Butter has been dear all the spring, but now is cheap enough, and there is no sale for any except the best quality. This is discouraging to the wives and daughters of farmers, who keep up the old style of making butter 'by hand.' A butter dealer says he felt very sorry for a nice, tidy, wholesome looking country girl who the other day brought to the city a lot of butter of her own manufacture, which was probably good enough for any one, but for which she could find no sale. She was told to try among cheap restaurants for a purchaser, which of course, meant selling the butter for a very low price. He said he knew how hard the poor girl had worked to make the butter, probably milking the cows, skimming the milk, washing milk pans, churning and working the butter, and she no doubt believed it to be as good as could be made, and, after bringing it to town, must have been very much discouraged not to be able to find a market for it at the market price. But such is life. Everybody nowadays wants creamery butter, and the best thing for farmers to do is to sell their milk at a creamery or produce a separator and sell their cream, and relieve their women folk of the labor of buttermaking, which is a thankless job these days."

The Lebanon Bank

The bank at Lebanon in which the company has stock and deposits has also succeeded, so the value of the assets at that place can only be guessed at. Times-table can tell how much the depositors will realize. J. G. Reed, N. S. Dalgeish and P. M. Sragan were selected as a committee to work with Mr. Carby in settling up the affairs of the bank.

ORDINANCE NO. 46.

An ordinance prohibiting the riding of Bicycles, Tricycles or Tandems on certain sidewalks in the City of Scio, and regulating the riding of Bicycles, Tricycles or Tandems on any sidewalk or crosswalk in the City of Scio.

Section 1.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons during the months of April, May, June, July, August, September and October in any year to ride a bicycle, tricycle or tandem of any kind upon any sidewalk or cross walk on Main street in the city of Scio from the intersection of Main and Oak streets to the south line of North street in said city of Scio, or upon any side walk on Mill street in the city of Scio from the west line of Main street to the east line of West street in said city of Scio.

Section 2.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a bicycle, tricycle or tandem of any kind upon any sidewalk or cross walk in the city limits of the city of Scio without an alarm bell attached to such bicycle, tricycle or tandem, and any person or persons when riding a bicycle, tricycle or tandem upon any sidewalk or cross walk in said city of Scio, shall ring such alarm bell, and in case of neglect, such police officers attention is attracted.

Section 3.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a bicycle, tricycle or tandem within the corporate limits of the city of Scio, at a greater rate of speed than one mile in ten minutes.

Section 4.—Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than \$2 nor more than \$10 or be imprisoned in the city jail not less than one day nor more than five days or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Section 5.—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the council and approved by the mayor.
