NEWS OF THE RAILWAYS.

Ross Islands (Amherst) Special Excursion Rates.

The Rock Island's proposition for cheap rate excursions to and from Colorado during this summer has been accepted by the Western Passenger Association. In consequence notice was served yesterday on Chairman McLeod by General Passenger Agent Somers, that the Rock Island will take independent action and put in effect a rate of one fare plus \$2.00 for the round trip from Chicago and all intermediate points east of the Missouri River to Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, Salt Lake City and Ogden. Tickets at this rate will be sold on June 29, July 9 and 17 and August 1. From Missouri River points the same rate will be made on the days following these dates. Tickets at this rate also will be sold from Missouri River gateways, Kansas City to Omaha, inclusive, on July 7, 8 and 9. Four special excursions also will be run by the Rock Island from Colorado common points to Chicago, and intermediate stations on June 22, July 12 and 20 and August 4. These excursion tickets, both east and west bound, will be limited for return passage to October 31. The Rock Island announces its intention of placing in service special trains for these excursions, leaving Chicago at 5 p. m. and making the run to Colorado with only one night on the road.—Chicago Tribune.

Prof. E. C. Peery, who was elected vice principal of the Mc-Minnville public schools, has declined the position, and will remain at Moro for another year, the school board at that place having increased his salary, and given him employment during the summer months.

In another column will be found a notice to contractors, calling for bids for the painting of the city hall. The building is badly in need of paint and the council made provision for its painting at its January term, when the estimate for the year's expenses was made.

At the meeting of the city council last Thursday Walter Blyeu was employed to look after the fire apparatus and act as chief engineer during a fire, at a salary of \$2 per month. For some time past the hose cart and hook and ladder wagon have been about the same as orphans, and this action on the part of the council was to provide some protection in case of fire.

Joseph Johnson, of Fox Valley, who has been assisting in putting in the machinery at the flax mill, met with quite a serious accident Sunday last, and one which might have

been fatal had he been a little nearer the machinery. In passing one of the skidding wheels he was struck by the knives and quite badly cut on the elbow and hand, and badly bruised on the leg, but is recovering quite rapidly, and will soon be able to be at work again.

Last week Robt. Cary, who lives near this city, had a number of sheep killed by dogs, and to protect his sheep from further harm put out a little poison, and on last Friday morning found two dogs in his field from which all signs of life had departed. One of the dogs was Win. Brenner's fine stock dog, but there are grave doubts as to whether or not he was actually engaged in sheep killing. At any rate he was in bad company, and therefore suffered the fatal result.

An ordinance was passed at the last meeting of the council which prohibits the riding on the sidewalks on Main and Mill streets, and bicycle riders should carefully study the same. The ordinance was made necessary on account of the large amount of careless riding indulged in by some of the younger bicyclists and those who wish to ride must now take the street for it. Signs bearing the words "bicycle limit" have been put up at the ends of the streets on which it is unlawful to ride on the walks. The ordinance also provides that all wheels carts for sale at A. The manufacture of flax fiber in this city has actually occurred at the mills of the Northwest Flax and Fiber Manufacturing Co., the first of the week, and the quality of the fiber turned out exceeded the expectations of all. The plant is only fitted with a small amount of machinery, enough to make a thorough test, and this was done the first of the week. The people of Scio should feel proud of the establishment of this enterprise in the city, as it will be the means of putting thousands of dollars into actual circulation in this locality, as well as giving employment to quite a number of men, not to mention the girls, but on the farms of those people who raise flax for the company. There is no possible room for doubting the fact that there is good money to be made in raising flax. That fact can be proved by the fact that the men who will take the time and trouble to figure a little. The company will be prepared to handle a large amount of flax straw next year, and will be coming full force in shape to meet the demand for the planting of enough flax to keep them busy, the object of contracting in the fall being to give farmers a chance to plow their ground in the fall so that it will be in good condition for spring plowing and sowing. The fiber made from straw raised in this locality is of a very fine quality, and the land hereabouts is particularly adapted for the raising of flax, therefore it cannot help but be a profitable crop to handle. The price of wheat does not justify the enormous amount of work required to produce that cereal, and the farmer who depends on it as a standard crop for money making must now turn his attention to numerous other crops to make even so, and he could not do better than sow a few acres each year to flax. He will always find a market for the seed at good figures, and the straw is just the part that the fiber company are anxious to get hold of. If you have a few acres of ground that would be suitable for flax just try it and we are of the opinion that you will find it more profitable than wheat.

Will Have a High School

At a meeting of the school board held in this city Monday evening the following resolutions was adopted:

Resolved, That we, as the Board of Directors of School District No. 35, in Lincoln County, Oregon, do at this time establish a higher department of education in the public schools in said district to be known as the "Scio High School," to include work and courses consistent with the high school work of the state.

This act will put the schools of this city on an equal basis with the schools of other towns of the valley, and give us a much better standing among other schools and schools and colleges of the state. The state provides a course of study for the high school work, and this admits graduates from the high schools to all the colleges of the state without examination. In making this move, and we are pleased to see the step made, as it will help the city as well as the school district, and will bring a large number of people here each year for the purpose of getting the benefit of our schools.
