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A FEW FARM NOTES

Have the nests low and in semi-darkness. A clover stubble makes a first class run for both fowls and chicks.

We believe in the "open door" for the poultry house at this season, and open windows, too.

To prepare the whole flock for the gray yard dose them well with drugs and nostrums to keep them healthy.

During a dry spell earth worms are scarce because they burrow into the moist earth. A little animal manure is a help to the chicks at such times.

Turkeys, both old and young, are great burgers! Let them roam and "pobble" up the bugs and hoppers, so long as they do your neighbors no harm.

The great issue in the Poultry yard now is "expansion." Expand coops and runs and give the young birds room. Expand the frames of the birds with plenty of wholesome food.

The display of nearly \$2,000,000 worth of roadsters in the parade of the Road Driver's Association in New York last evening, indicates that after all the bicycle and automobile have not yet done so much to displace the horse as a means of diversion.

A reliable remedy to prevent and stroy the red and black ants is to sprinkle ground cloves around their haunts. Ground cinnamon and pulverized borax are said to have the same effect, but we cannot vouch for their efficacy; the ground cloves have always done the work for us and it was not necessary for us to try the other remedies.

Find the chicks and holes from which they come and scatter unslaked lime or borax around them. If these fail, try this: Mix equal parts of cornmeal and red lead, and set enough molasses to make a medium thin paste. Spread the mixture on plates and set on the floor in the evening. The next morning the plates will be covered with dead cockroaches. Reset the plates every evening until the cockroaches are destroyed.—Mary B. Keefe, in Orange Judd Farmer.

ROSS E. HIBLER. About Flax Fiber

E. F. Larimore has returned from Walla Walla, where he went to have some flax, worked out at the plant in this city, made up into bags, twine and cloth. He brought home samples which prove beyond all question the fact that material made from flax is far superior to that made from jute fiber. A superior cotton for making cloth and packing can also be made from flax fiber as can also a pulp from the woody portion of the manufacture of buckets, tubs, etc.

The test was made distinctly under the supervision of Mr. J. B. Catron, warden of Washington state prison, and in his report on the same, to the state board of audit and control Mr. Catron says:

"I desire to state in reference to my personal test in the manufacture of flax straw finished by the Northwest Flax & Fiber Mfg. Co. of Scio, Oregon that it proved beyond doubt that flax fiber can be successfully substituted for jute and twine. You will permit me further to state that a stronger, and more satisfactory burlap, hop cloth or grain bag can be manufactured from flax fiber than is possible to be produced from jute fiber. We can also manufacture the flax fiber into a twine, that is as good as the best on any market, and in regard to this twine I further we cannot manufacture a satisfactory twine for the truck from jute fiber. Ordinarily a grain bag manufacturer from jute can only use one season, while we can manufacture a bag from flax that with ordinary care can be used from three to five years."

The above letter speaks for itself, and coming as it does from a manufacturer of grain bags should settle all questions as to the success of the enterprise established in our city. It only remains for the farmers to grow the flax.
