A FEW FARM NOTES

B. E. Childs, who formerly operated a cheese factory at Brownsville, Oregon, is now running at Lafayette, Oregon.

The Oregon Poultry Journal says the poultry show at the Oregon State Fair this year will be the biggest and best ever held in the great Northwest.

It may not be generally known that the so-called Belgian Hare is not a true hare; a true hare does not burrow nor does it pluck fur from its body to line its nest. Yet the line between hare and rabbit is in some cases hard to draw.

J. D. McCoy, of Milton, Oregon, has sold to Chrisman & Parker, of Kearny Nebraska, 14,000 head of range horses to be delivered September 1, 1900. The horses are mostly grade Shire and Clydesdale stock and brought about \$40 per head.

A train of fifteen carloads of cattle mostly yearlings and 2 years olds, were shipped from Medford, Oregon, to Cutbank, Montana, last week where they will be put on range. There were 200 head and the price paid was from \$19 to \$25 per head.

Barker & Pitter, of Gilliam county have sold 3999 yearling ewes to Charles Cowell, of Missoula, Mont. The price paid being \$2.95. Mr. Cowell also bought 2700 head of one-half crop, and occasionally a driver from over the trails, via Huntington to Montana.

Notwithstanding the general shortage of the prune crop throughout Clark county, Washington, many orchardists in different localities report from one-fourth to one-half crop, and occasionally an orchard is heard from which gives promise of turning off a full crop.
