# A FEW FARM NOTES

Chickens in California are paying \$12.50 to \$17.50 per ton for good to choice Cornish chickens.

It is probable that the ravages of the army worm, or cutworm, are about over in Oregon and Washington.

The wool market at San Francisco continues dull. Oregon valley wool is quoted at 16 to 19 cents.

Rauch and Range says the poultry business has increased wonderfully among the Seattle commission men who make a specialty of this business.

The new creamery at Silverton, Oregon, has commenced operations. It is run on the cream-gathering plan and employs two teams in collecting cream.

We have heard very little complaint so far this season about the cost of the Italian prunes. A little of it is to be seen in some of the orchards near Portland.

The Fruit and Poultry World is the latest addition to the agricultural press of the Northwest. It is published at Medford, Oregon, by Weber & Chosmors.

If the weather continues favorable hops will ripen about ten days earlier than usual in Oregon. This will lessen the danger of damage by rain and mold.

Benton county has organized a campaign for the purpose of making a county exhibit at the Oregon State Fair this year. It will make a big effort to capture the first premium in 1908.

There was a very fine cherry crop in some sections of Union county, Oregon, this year. Fortunately the growers there rarely suffer loss from summer rains which so often crack cherries in western Oregon.

Oregon breeders of dairy cattle should be at the fair in full force this year. The great increase in interest in dairying in the state is making a great many farmers think on the subject of the breed of their cows.

Dr. James Withycombe, vice-director of the Oregon Experiment station, will judge the live stock at the California State Fair again this year. The managers of that fair appoint a first class judge when they find one who is profitable as the other—selected.

I believe it is more cruel to compel poultry to roost in a house in midwinter with shales in, than to compel them to roost in the trees the year round. It is better one method as profitable as the other—selected.

The price of butter at Elgin on the first of July this year was 10 cents as against 14 1/2 cents on the first of July, 1907. No low-priced creamery butter has gone into cold storage anywhere in the United States this year.

The Roseburg Poultry reports that Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Dreyer, of Roseburg, have established a pleasurable and profitable business in raising the Silver pheasant their specialty.

Oregon swine breeders note an improved demand for choice stock for breeding purposes, and the leading breeders of improved breeds, White, Poland China and Berkshire have been securing fresh blood from the best herds in the east.

Rauch and Range criticizes very severely the business methods of R. Merchand & Co., a Seattle commission house which is advertising in an Oregon agricultural paper. The advertisements of this firm are of the kind to make prudent people cautious.

The new cheese factory at Sheridan, Oregon, is not receiving enough milk to make it a paying institution. It is only getting about 500 pounds per day. The Sun says it is hoped that a considerably larger amount will be supplied after harvest. If not the factory will have to be closed.

The Oregon fruit which is now coming to the Portland market is unusually attractive for this season of the year. It is probable that our fruits of all kinds will average higher than usual in quality and appearance this season. On an average the orchards have been better cared for than ever before.

The Southern Pacific company will carry all exhibits to and from the fair free of charge. The exhibitors will pay the charges on the shipment to the fair, but this amount will be refunded when the articles are delivered to the company's agents for shipment to the point from which they were taken.

The demand for pure bred hocks of mutton breeds is again greater than the breeders of Western Oregon can supply. This is encouraging to the breeders as well as to every body who is interested in the development of fine stock breeding.
