Stayton Creamery Closed.

The separating plant operated in this city the past summer by E. J. Seeley, of Albany, was shipped to Albany in a few days. The Mail considers this the worst item of news it has printed in years. It removes from this field one of the foremost creamery men in Oregon, one who has paid patrons of the plant higher prices than any other operator in the valley. The shut down is due not so much to sufficient patronage as it is to changed conditions. The management recognizes that power separators will soon be a thing of the past, that hand separators on the farm in time, will supersede them. Inasmuch as Mr. Seeley operates plants at Fluvius and Albany, and had no investment in churns here, it was a business proposition with them to consolidate his interests where it would yield immediate and lasting results.—Mail.

SHEARED

Portland will have a 10-story hotel next year, if the plans of Manager McGrath, of the Hotel Parkins, mature. The hotel is now six stories high, and the four additional stories are to be set on top of these. A steel skeleton frame with fire proof floor and walls, is contemplated, and the 10th or last story is to be entirely devoted to sample rooms for druggists.

The S. P. steam shovel arrived at Natron Wednesday. A switch has been laid in on the side of the hill, east of the big trestle between Springfield and Natron. Here the steam shovel will dig dirt for the next six months. The McKenzie river bottom trestle will be filled. The grade where the shovel is working will be cut down about eight feet. The outfit consists of 16 flat cars, steam shovel and quarters for men. About 40 men are employed. Word has been received in Salem, says the Statesman, that the winning name on the Dove place near Independence, owned by Horst Bros. won the gold medal at the Paris exposition. The Oregon hops were placed in competition with the truck and growing country in the world, and it is a source of much pride to Oregon growers that the hops grown here are the best the world produces, according to the most competent judges.

A hobo Japanese stayed with the Southern Pacific section Japsat Jefferson Wednesday night, and the next morning started south along the track, says the Review. He was evidently very ill, but about something, for he knocked down a signal post and then took a rock and exploded a torpedo that had been placed on the track. He paid dearly for his last act, for three of his fingers were blown off and his right hand badly mangled.

Last Monday evening as the Albany local was coming alone near Millersburg the train struck a stick of cord wood, with the track and ran over being ditches. Everyone was considerably shaken up. After stopping the train investigation revealed the cause of the trouble. However, the jar had broken a steam pipe on the engine, but as it proved nothing serious, the train ran into Albany about ten minutes late. It is not known whether the stick of wood came upon the track by purpose or accident.

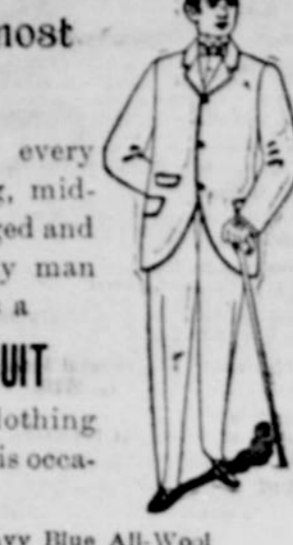
