Fire at Silverton.

Last Saturday morning fire broke in Silverton, and for a time the entire business portion of the town was given up as lost.

The fire broke out in Cooledge & McClaine's building, at 4 a. m. It was occupied by I. Benjamin, of Portland and Wednesday of the World; general merchandise, and was under the management of Ned Wise.

The loss is as follows: Cooledge & McClaine, building, \$8000; O. J. Fellows' hall, \$200; Knights of Pythias' hall, \$200; Woodmen of the World, \$100; I. Benjamin—; George Melson, general merchandise, \$500; C. F. DeGrive, \$200; Postoffice, T. W. Riches, P. M. \$100; F. E. Wray, jeweler, \$100; Pacific States Telephone, \$100.

Benjamin Wise, manager of the store located in the building where the fire originated, hired a team and buggy from one of the livery barns soon after the blaze started, and drove for Woodburn, where he was arrested and taken to Salem charged with incendiarism, and after a preliminary trial was bound over with bonds fixed at \$2000, in default of which he languishes in jail. There is strong evidence against him.
