ON account of the success of the county exhibits at the state fair this year, the board has decided to increase the appropriation in this field and will give the following premiums: Grand first prize \$250 and a silver cup worth \$100, second \$200, third \$150, fourth \$100, fifth \$75 and sixth \$50, which sums will be quite an incentive to the different counties of the state in making an exhibit of their resources, and one that will be of some benefit to the county and its people. Local Teachers' Institute.

Institute opened Friday evening, December 14, with a lecture by State Superintendent Ackerman, who lectured before a large audience. His remarks were preceded by a short musical and literary program rendered by the Scio young people. The State Superintendent spoke to some length in a general way, on higher education, through preparation, duty of parents, etc., and kept the audience thoroughly interested during its delivery. His lecture was very applicable to the situation in Scio, and seems to be appreciated by all who heard it. Supt. Jackson presided and added to the evening's program with a few well chosen remarks. Miss Winifred Stunkers rendered an excellent recitation and Miss Kate Cary and associates sang a few good songs.

SAVED UPON'S SESSION.

Institute opened with song service, followed by prayer by Rev. W. Richardson. Superintendent Jackson addressed the institute and then opened the work of the day by introducing Rev. Campbell, of Mt. Pleasant, who read an excellent paper entitled, "Influence of Home on the School." L. B. Gibson discussed methods in teaching penmanship, a topic assigned to Mrs. Prill, who was unavoidably absent. Mr. Bond discussed primary number work, giving illustration. At the afternoon session Prof. Geddes spoke for an hour on the topic, "Who is the Successful Teacher." After this Mr. Ingram took up reading and Mr. Ingram closed with some good advice to parents. Superintendent Jackson took occasion to make some encouraging remarks from time to time, and the session with a talk on the coming county and state institute at Albany.

Miss Cary and her assistants sang a few good songs during the afternoon. Good audiences were in attendance, and taken as a whole the institute was quite a success. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted: "We, the teachers in local institute assembled, do extend our thanks to the citizens of Scio for the courtesy and kindness shown to us, and also extend our thanks to Superintendent Ackerman for his able address."
