There are now being received at the Southern Pacific car shops at Sacramento an order of ninety-four locomotives from Eastern works, which are to be used in the various lines of the company. Some are to take the place of locomotives going out of commission, or into lighter work but fully seventy-five per cent indicate an increased business, demanding handling capacity. Twenty-two will be used on passenger trains, and the balance for freight. The freight engines are of the consolidation compound pattern and are of the largest type used. They present new features in that the fire-box is much wider than usual. In addition the compound have begun work on ten six-foot vestibule baggage cars for the line. The cars are being turned out at the rate of one a month. The largest oil car in the world, with a capacity of 13,000 gallons, has just been completed at the shops.

A FEW FARM NOTES

We note that U. S. Grant, of Dallas, Oregon, has been appointed by the American Goat Breeders Association as Inspector for Oregon.

The winter up to date has been excellent for fowls. There have been but four or five cold days and yet the air must not be so chilly that things will freeze.

It is surprising how rapidly fowls fatten, and the farmer who once tries the plan of putting the birds intended for roasts, whether they be chickens, ducks, geese or turkeys, into close coops and feeding them as he does his pigs or hogs will do so ever afterwards.

Mild weather such as we have been having has been beneficial to fowls in inducing an increase in egg production. This is evidence that hens will lay any time in the year if only the farmer will provide a warm, sunny house for them and feed and water well.

No part of the laundry work is as a rule, so unsatisfactory as the washing of the woolen garments. The structure of the fiber is so different from that of linen and cotton that it should receive different treatment in the laundry. Rubbing and wringing cause the wool fibers to knot, thus giving us a thickened and shrunken fabric therefore woolen goods should be sopped and squeezed to remove the dirt, and the water should be pressed out; not wrung out.—February Ladies' Home Journal.
