An acknowledgment of gratitude or any sort of concession to the Americans, they say, would "endanger the sovereignty of their republic." Who gave them the chance to organize a republic? If the United States had not intervened in the spring of 1898 the rebellion would have been suppressed by the end of that year. Instead of having Gen. Wood for a Governor they would have Weyler, with all the disastrous consequences to themselves that Weyler's victory would bring to them. The antics of the men like Cisneros and the rest of the Yankee-haters in the island give some color of truth to the assertion of many Englishmen, Frenchmen, Germans and other foreigners that the Cubans do not know the meaning of rational freedom, and do not deserve it.

Why do people rush from the East to the state of Washington in preference to Oregon? One reason is that Washington has been more extensively advertised; another, that a large number go there with no money and with the expectation of obtaining work. There are hundreds of men with families now in the Sound country with little means and hunting for work. The result is that houses in Seattle and Tacoma are in demand, rental going up and laborers finding the market for the services they offer well supplied. Oregon can feel congratulated that she is not drawing to a great extent this class of immigration, and highly pleased that homeseekers with capital are coming here and will be followed this spring by hundreds and probably by thousands, who recognize the superiority of Oregon over Washington.
