**Growing Fast.** Prof. F. L. Kent, of the O. A. C., is authority for the statement that the cheese industry in Oregon is growing very rapidly, as last year there were 23 factories established. About one-half of the cheese manufactured in the state is made in Tillamook county. The past year the cheese manufacturers have yielded a better profit than the butter factories. The larger the quantities handled the less the cost per pound. One factory handled one-fourth of a million pounds per year. Cheese can be held a long time. Two pounds of cheese can be taken out of milk to one of butter. Seattle and Albany trade takes a large percentage of our butter and cheese. There is no danger of over production. California dealers say that Oregon cheese is as good as any produced. The industry is bound to grow.
