Donations are this week being asked for the erection of a new building for the flax mill, to take the place of the one destroyed by fire last fall, and we are informed that our people are responding right liberally. We hear it rumored that a company which has secured the possession of a large amount of the timber on upper Crabtree will soon commence the work of surveying a railroad from this city to this timber belt. Our informant states that this company has already looked over the route, and are now making preparations for beginning the work at an early date. The timber in question is about the finest body of fir, hemlock and cedar that is to be found in this part of the country, and the large amount of it amply justifies the building of a railroad in it, and the people of Scio are only too glad to welcome such an enterprise.

At the regular meeting of the council last Thursday evening, the matter of grading and graveling the street near the Odd Fellows hall was discussed at length, and the committee on streets and public property was instructed to look after the proposition and report to the mayor. Most of the property owners have agreed to have the street improved, and doubtless the committee will so report. There is a desire among most of the property owners on Main street to have that thoroughfare improved the coming summer. The street is in good shape, and with the addition of about two or three loads of gravel in the center the length of the street it would remain in prime condition for years to come. Nothing adds to the appearance of a town so much as good streets, and if the good work done on our streets a couple of years ago is repeated, or even in part, our streets will remain in good shape the year round.
