Has Commenced Work.

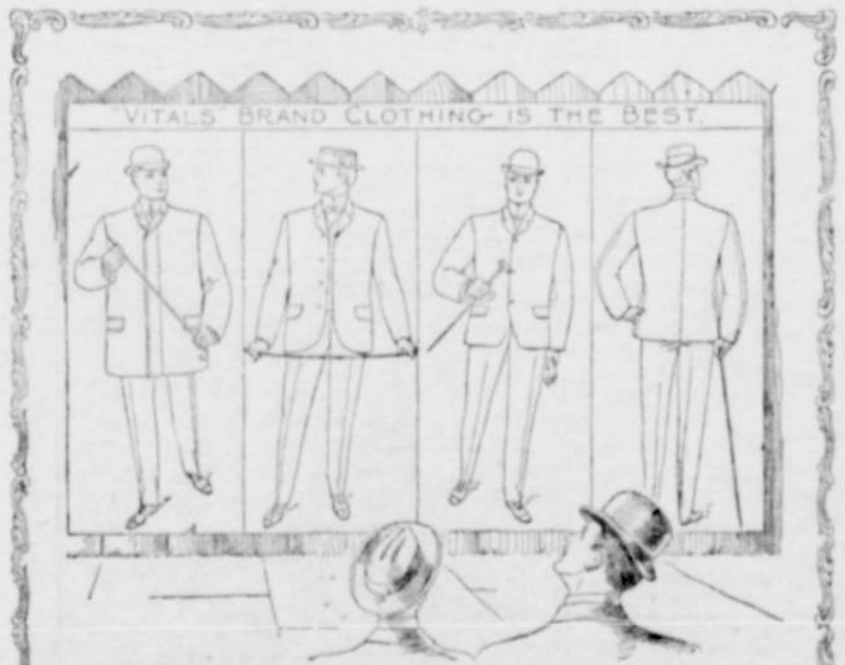
