Sec. 6, page 38. If a district does not adhere to the course of study it will forfeit 25 per cent of the 5 mill tax.

The state board rules that questions can only be submitted to graduates of 8th grade. The teachers and one member of the board are required to sign the following: We herein certify that the above named applicant has completed the 8th grade and is of good moral character.

Smith, of this city, and he preceded her to the silent grave June 19, 1900. Two children were born to her, Henry Myer, of this city being the only one to survive her, the other having died some years ago. A sister, Mrs. Nellie Grant, of Dallas, and a half brother, of Cape Nome, a half brother, are the only relatives of deceased, aside from her sympathy to those dear ones who are left behind to mourn the death of loving mother, kind friend and neighbor.
