shipped from Hepper, Or., last week.

The Flato Commission Company,
of Omaha, has just completed a deal
for the purchase of 100,000 Oregon
sheep. Twenty-five carloads will
be sent from Baker City, and the
remainder from various other
places in the state.

Jane Wright, a sheep dealer
from North Yakama, was in Port-
land this week. Mr. Wright is
still buying a few thousand head of
sheep now and then to supply the
trade he has built up on the Sound
and British Columbia points.

Close estimates of the wool clip of
Umatilla Co for 1901, give 2,250,000
pounds, from 125,000 sheep, the
average being about ten pounds for
the sheep. There are now about
350,000 sheep in Umatilla County.
Wool is selling at 6 1/2 to 10 cents
per pound, according to the quanti-
ty of dirt carried.

One hundred and sixty glass jars
of large size and all of them filled
with fruits of Oregon, were loaned
to California for exhibition at Paris.
They were asked for by the Cali-
fornians, for the purpose of helping
out their sales, on a trip to the
California Exposition. The jars
were turned to the wall at Paris,
and California ladies pasted on the
front of the jars. The few that were
returned are now at Buffalo, where
any body who may desire can see
the posture of the California trick
Oregonian.
