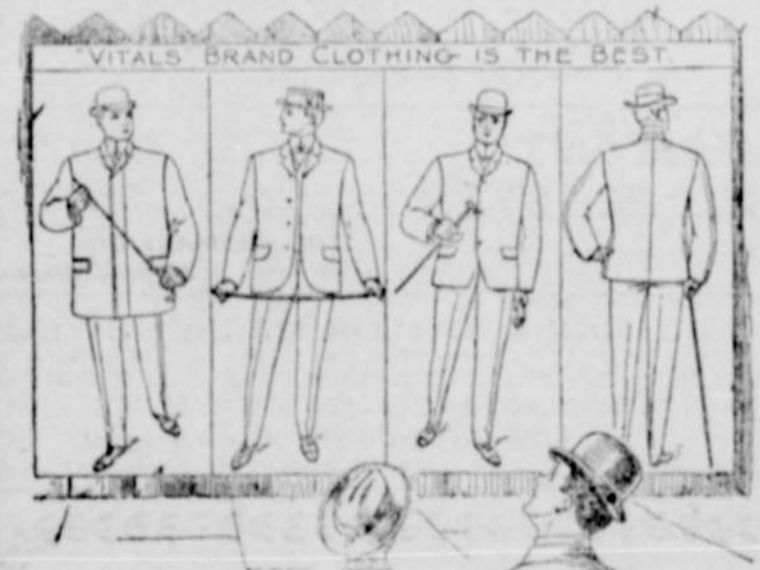

The West Seio mail wagon came to town in a little shorter time last Friday than usual. Norman Daley was in charge of the team, and after putting a number of milk cans in the back he took the hitch rope and went to the rear of the rig to the cans, when the team took a notion to go to town, and go they did. They shook out all the cans and one of the mail sacks, but no other damage was done, and the team was stopped at the hotel.

We were just a little in error in our report of the accident that befell John Brock last week. It seems as though he was standing on the rear of the wagon and the bridge he was crossing gave way and participation the team and wagon to the ground about ten feet below, and when the bridge broke he jumped, but has no recollection of lighting. He was pretty badly mangled up about the neck, and lost several teeth, but is able to be in town, and will soon be as good as new, with the exception of some "store teeth."

The first month's returns from the cream shipped from the Seio creamery to Portland, netted the farmer fifteen and one-half cents per pound for their butter fat, and the price seems to be satisfactory to all the patrons, although it is not as high as some would like to have received. The price of butter in the market is a way below what it was this time last year, and there is every indication that it will be higher during the coming months, in which case

the farmers will receive more for their butter fat. And again the price to the farmer can be materially raised if the farmer will induce his neighbor to patronize the creamery, for the greater the output the lower proportionately will be the operating expenses, and in this manner the income of the farmer will be increased. The creamery is now handling about one fourth as much milk as it could handle without increasing the expenses, therefore it is plain that the more milk they receive the more money the farmer will receive. Let everyone do what they can to increase the milk receipts, and not only help your neighbor thereby but help yourself as well.

At an adjourned meeting of the city council held last Friday evening the ordinance prohibiting cows from running at large was suspended during the present month, the object being to enable the cattle to eat off the grass which has grown to considerable height along the unused streets and on vacant lots. The laws is not exactly in accord with this state of affairs but a large number of our people desired their cows to run out and the council acted in an endeavor to please as many of the citizens as possible. A resolution was adopted requiring the property owners along Oak, Water, McKinney and Wheeler streets to grade and gravel these thoroughfares. The committee on streets and Public property were instructed to have gravel three loads wide put on Main street from North street to the southern limits of the city. This street was graded and graveled two years ago, and the present improvement is to maintain the present condition of it. There was a remonstrance against any improvement of Wheeler street, but it was set aside, owing to the fact that the improvement would be of great benefit to the city.
