United States Senator John H.  
Mitchell has gone suddenly to Euro-

nouncing the serious illness of his  
wife. He expects to return to Ore-  
gon at the earliest possible moment.  
He very much regretted being com-  
pelled to leave at this time.

The holder of bonds purchased  
from the Cuban junta, for a small  
fraction of their face value, may find  
that Uncle Sam will object to their  
payment in full by the new Cuban  
government. It will be one of the  
duties of Uncle Sam to prevent the  
infant government of Cuba from be-  
ing robbed.

One good thing has happened to  
Cuba. American system of sanita-  
tion has completely stamped out  
yellow fever and there has not been  
a death from the disease in the is-  
land this year. This republic proves  
a blessing to all countries with which  
it comes in direct contact. Cuba  
and the Philippines will rise up  
some day and call us blessed.

At least one-half of the million-  
aires of the world are Americans.  
In a list of noted rich men who are  
reputed to be worth \$25,000,000 or  
more there are included forty-four  
Americans, twenty citizens of Great  
Britain, nine Australians, four  
Frenchmen, three Russians, three  
South Africans, one Spanish-Ameri-  
can, one Italian, one Belgian and  
one Chinaman.

So long as the crime of stealing  
state funds is outlawed at the end of  
three years in this state it will stand  
as an incentive to thieving official-  
ism. Let the limitation be raised to  
at least ten years and the chances of  
escape from political criminality will  
be perceptibly lessened. While the  
present law stands, great care  
should be taken in examining the  
accounts of state officials. If the  
accounts are strictly honest they will  
take pleasure in having their ac-  
counts examined in minutest detail.

The war department is now firing  
an illuminating shell that bursts in  
the air and emits a fiery body of  
globular shape, which vividly lights  
up a large area for a considerable  
time. The experiments are for the  
purpose of improving and perfecting  
bombs that are now made for the  
purpose of exposing the position of  
an enemy at night, and to reveal the  
character of defenses to be attacked.  
These projectiles explode on im-  
pact, liberating a flaming compound.  
One compound, consisting of sul-  
phur, saltpetre, and a hydrocarbon,  
is a blue light mixture. The illu-  
mination lasts as long as the saltpetre  
supplies oxygen to maintain com-  
bustion. Experiments are also un-  
der way for a reverse sort of bomb,  
which in bursting liberates dense  
clouds of smoke, for the purpose of  
concealing the movements of troops  
in the field. This is to be antidis-  
to the former name.—Topeka Capital.
