EDITORIAL HASH

OUR AIM IN LIFE.

What are you trying to do? Men and women who have made the world better, have known what they were trying to do and have done it, or come so near it that the whole human family were made better and happier by their efforts. There is a high ideal for every one, no matter what his limitations are, and to early get the right object for which to labor should be one of life's first lessons. A parent or teacher may have a clear idea of a high purpose of their life outside of the children's general welfare and this purpose may be infused into the minds of the boys and girls, or the thoughts may wholly center in preparing a single child for an ideal life. In this getting an object—some definite plan and ideal purpose of life, it is not the lack of desire on the part of those who fail, so much as the lack of the first or fundamental ideas of things absolutely necessary in order to accomplish anything noble. It is a common thing to hear those who are considered good, respectable men and women lying and even boasting of it, and by such examples young minds are warped and twisted from the plumb line in their character building. The young people who are soon to take our places in the work of sustaining what the true noble men and noble women of this and past ages have built, should have as the very first principle on which to build, a perfect desire to do right, to tell the exact truth about everything. After this perfect desire, then industry should be placed in the foundation. These two, honesty and industry, are not small items in the building of our temple of life. Failure is absolutely certain without them and an examination of the wrecks of every hand prove that poverty, mental, moral and financial, is the offspring of poverty of veracity and application. Honesty and industry, we repeat, must be secured, and then with these fully established the accomplishment of some definite life work may be safely undertaken. And once firmly fixed on the solid rock of these two principles and reaching out toward a definite high purpose there is no such thing as failure, let life be long or short, on a large or small scale, in a heathen or in a civilized land, in a time of peace or in a time of war. Enemies may exaggerate one's weakness and mistakes; they may be envious of one's every success and incite mutiny among his best friends; they may injure him financially, and yet as long as life lasts they cannot drive him from his main fortress, and when the final balance of the life struggle is made up, it will be found that the high aim itself is always more than a credit that continually balanced any debit that could be placed on the account. Living or dead, an investment in a high purpose with a capital of truth and right and justice—coins that pass current everywhere, failure is impossible and success is certain.

He was taken from the chair and laid upon the floor, and by this time had breathed his last.

He was a member in good standing in the A. O. U. W. and carried a policy in that order of \$2,000. He also had \$2,000 in the New York Mutual Life. He was also a member of the L. O. O. F.

It is thought his wife deliberately shot him, but there is no evidence which has not shown up. There is a possibility that it was an accident. At any rate he is dead and those who at some past time have differed with him are now disposed to let the mantle of charity fall over him and his—Pineville Review.

Cause of Mottled Butter.

The "mottling" of butter, the occurrence throughout the body of a line of goods of light streaks or spots, is a very common fault at certain times; a fault more annoying than serious, yet detracting from the appearance of the goods and frequently lessening the selling price.

- In a series of studies made at this station, a very careful effort was made to locate the actual cause of the trouble, from which the following conclusions were drawn:
1. "The uneven distribution of salt in the case of unevenly colored butter spoken of as mottled butter."
 2. "Washing the butter with water below 40 degrees does not cause mottling. It does, however, make a little more working necessary to thoroughly distribute the salt."
 3. "The light colored streaks or portions of mottled butter are not caused by an excess of casing, but the mottles are evidently caused by some physical action of salt on the butter, which causes it to admit more light."
 4. "Mottles can be prevented by working the butter sufficiently to thoroughly distribute the salt."
 5. "Butter washed with water at 40 degrees and under, and worked immediately shows a better grain when sufficiently worked to insure its being evenly colored than with any other treatment."
 6. "Washing butter with water at 40 degrees and under does not injure its firmness when subjected to high temperature."—Chas. F. Dossie, in House's Dairyman.
