Grain is being threshed in many sections of the county this week, and the yield is far better than in past years. The average will be at least a third better, and the grain is of much better quality. When good crops predominate the farmer is sappy, and when the farmer has money to spend everybody is benefited. Good crops and a fair price makes good times for all. The flax crop, too, is much better than in past seasons, and this crop will be means of distributing many thousands of dollars among our people. The crop is being pulled this week, and the average price of \$3 per acre is being paid for pulling, which is scattered among old and young, and many families are devoting their entire time to flax pulling.

The Blue Mountain Eagle says when the cattle market opened up this year the opinion was prevalent among the cattle dealers of Grant and other Eastern Oregon counties that all classes of stock would not command last year's prices by at least \$2 to \$4 per head. Cattle men hesitated to accept the reduced prices and for several months buyers refused to pay more than the cut figures. The conditions have now changed some and last year's prices are being paid again. These prices appear higher than prices in the East this season justify, says the Eagle, but from the demand for steers, growers can secure last year's figures for all they have for market.

Some swine breeders still believe hogs should have a mudhole to wallow in, because it comes natural to the hog, kills vermin and cools the hot-blooded animal off in hot weather. No doubt it does all these things, but it does some other things also, which shows that it is a very costly way to cool hogs or kill lice. The hog wallow soon becomes exceedingly filthy, and in them disease germs find a favorable breeding place, and in course of time the mud hole and the surrounding soil become contaminated, and the first thing the farmer knows he becomes anxious to learn what will stop the swine plague or cholera.

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What Ought to Be Done. There is a rise in the price of grain sacks throughout the Northwest, and a threatened further increase. This is an easy matter, owing to the fact that all the sacks are in few hands, and the prospect is that there will be more grain harvested than sacks to put it in. There is no need for such a condition to exist in the future. The Northwest ought to make its own grain sacks, and they should not be made out of jute, but from the flax grown in the section, and the finer part of the flax ought to be used in making sacks.
