Mrs. Laura Paul and daughter, Kate, of Seio, were callers in our midst one evening last week.

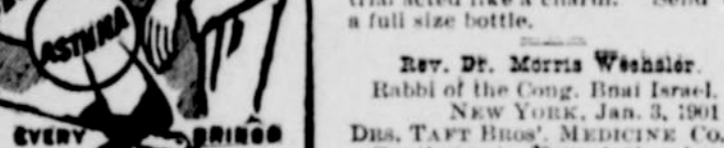
"Doc" Turner and wife and daughter Lulu, were on a flying trip to Albany one day last week.

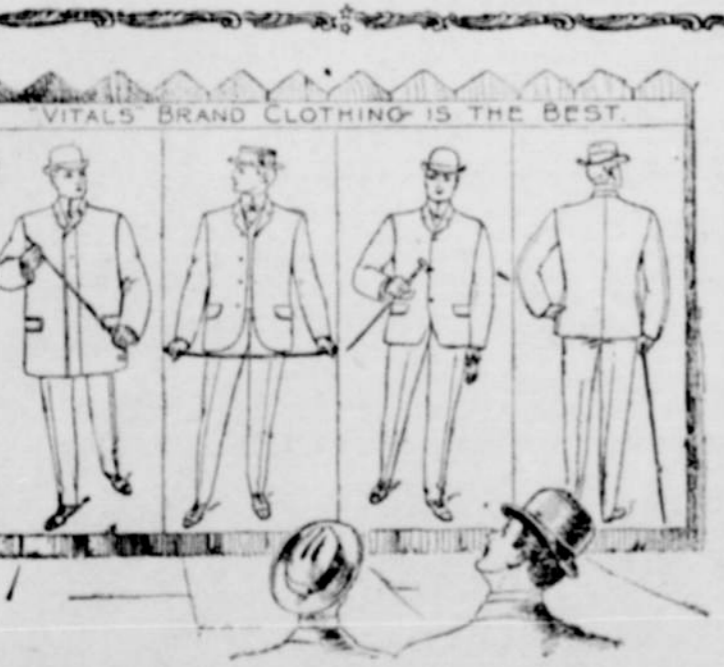
