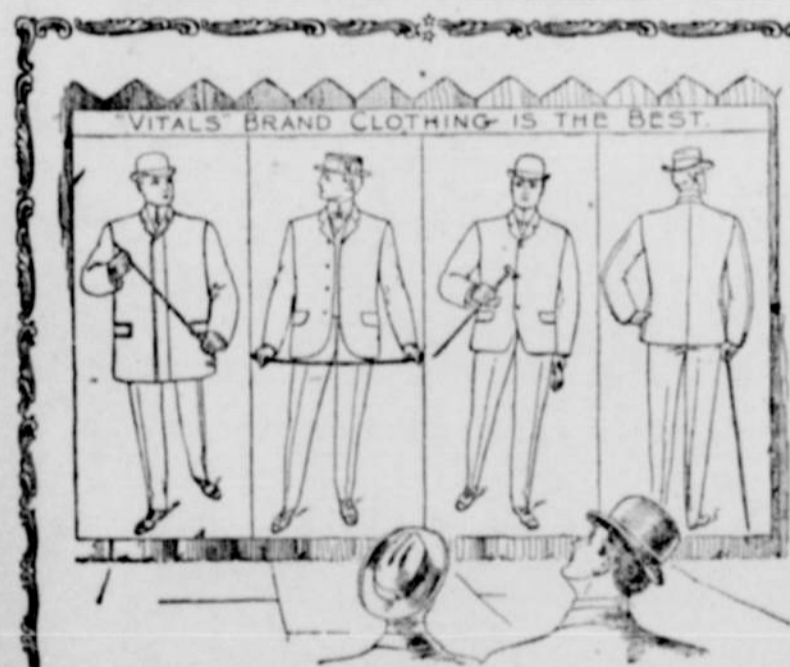

COURTESY TOWARD WOMEN.  
London Far Beyond New York in Recognition of Her Efforts.

The international convention, recently held in London, of women interested in the temperance work, was a notable demonstration of the deepening interest which women are taking in all reformatory movements. Probably, says Leslie's Weekly, there has never been assembled in Great Britain a gathering so truly representative of the Christian and philanthropic sentiment of the enlightened women of the world as this, in which one hundred and fifty American delegates actively participated. One of the striking incidents of the convention was that, on the opening Sunday, two hundred London pupils were occupied by women. Notable as the gathering was, the London press seems to have given it little consideration, and the notice bestowed upon it was in some cases a great deal more insulting than commendatory in character. One conservative journal characterized the convention as composed of "blatant female agitators who want taste and propriety are empty terms." When the Christian Endeavorers swarmed down upon this metropolis by the ten thousand some two or three years ago, the daily newspapers were as much surprised and puzzled by the demonstration as the London journals seem to have been by the women's white ribbon gathering, but New York journalism, instead of criticizing and belittling, welcomed and devoted itself to setting forth conspicuously the achievements of the visiting organizations, thereby not only maintaining its self-respect, but earning the hearty gratitude of a vast multitude of readers. English newspapers would do well to emulate this example of courtesy and true journalistic catholicity.

Cattle, Farms and Facts.

In management is evolved rapid growth, and the latter is dependent on balanced rations of food. The fact is, the farmer and cattleman want to get up to their business. The old timer who sneered at "book farming" and the "readin" farmer has outlived his day, if any such are alive now. Brafs are at a premium on the farm, and as profitably employed there as elsewhere, in legitimate and productive pursuits. The scientific farmer is the man who knows how. The best definition of science is "ascertained facts." No one should be afraid of that word.—Indiana Farmer.

Teacher's Institute.  
A district teachers' institute will convene Albany college chapel on Wednesday, September 4, at 9 a. m., and continue in session seven days. The institute will be conducted by County School Superintendent W. L. Jackson. State School Superintendent J. H. Ackerman will also be present and assist in making it a success.

State Fair.  
The outlook for a successful state fair has never been before so promising. Better attractions and amusement will be offered than ever in the past and they will be in greater variety. The exhibits of livestock will exceed that of any previous year; while the speed program promises the best, sport and entertainment possible.

More horses are entered for the state fair races for this year than ever before a month before the opening; while never have so many other attractions attempted to make contracts to appear on the grounds. In the livestock department of officers are rushed to death. Already 228 blooded cattle are entered for exhibition purposes and the officers ordered the construction of more cattle stalls to accommodate all that will come, their stall room being exhausted. Among the cattle for which space is requested are severely bred never before shown in Oregon.

The county exhibits also promise to be very extensive and an excellent show of agricultural products will be had. The old pavilion will be entirely devoted to these county exhibits. It will present a sight worth coming many miles to see. It will be a splendid exhibition of what Oregon farms and gardens can produce and will be a great attraction for visitors from other states as well as for those located in Oregon.

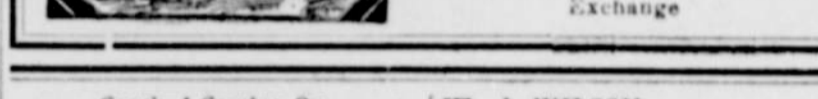

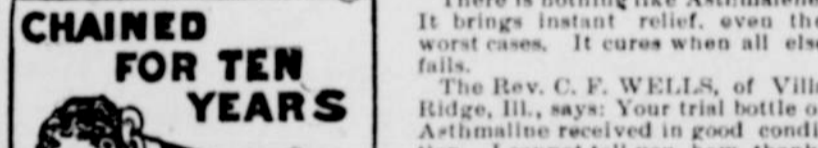
