EDITORIAL HASH

Representatives of the different trades in the Great Britain are over here to learn how it is done. The British have at last openly acknowledged the superiority of the American manufactured products. They are now in America to gain ideas with the promulgation of which they hope to complete with those who impart to them modern and improved method. There is no effort of concealment on the part of the Americans, who are fearless, and have good reason to be.

A change has come o'er the scene. The Southern Pacific is equipping its locomotives to burn oil instead of wood. Storage oil tanks, having a capacity of 30,000 barrels each, will be erected at different points along the road. This will seriously injure the important wood-cutting industry along the line. Consumers of wood will in time appreciably note the Southern Pacific's oil substitution, and it can safely be opined that locomotive firemen will gladly bid farewell to hard labor necessitated by the use of wood.

In Ohio there are roaring wells in widely separated parts of the state, and they indicate the existence of a mighty subterranean river. There are evidences of other subterranean streams in other states, notably in western Kansas, the real or mother Arkansas river thought by many to be underground. It was this impression that imbued the idea in many that irrigation could easily be brought about. There seems little doubt of these rivers under foot, and the time is coming when they will be utilized and will prove untold blessings to the drought-stricken district.

Expanding to Guam has given us a good cooling station and to the people there prosperity and happiness, and so pleased are they with the present and wonderfully improved conditions that they now desire to learn the English language. Gradually the United States becomes more powerful and gradually the language spreads. In time it will be universally spoken. We must be the chosen race. The Garden of Eden, 'tis said, was situated in southwest Kansas, notwithstanding the fact that there are now few apple trees in that section of the country.

Reports from Dawson now indicate that the gold output of the Klondike for this season is much less than the estimates. It is doubtful if the total will exceed \$15,000,000 where \$25,000,000 was looked for. It seems that last year was the banner year for that district. There is nothing surprising in the rapid exhaustion of the cream of the placer deposits. It is simply another instance of what happened in every other placer camp in the world. However this does not by any means imply their exhaustion or that the Klondike is not a good country for mining any longer.

Apparently the leading Filipinos are pleased with the conditions which are appearing in their quarter of the world. The civil government which the Taft commission has been putting into operation in different parts of the islands is giving satisfaction to most of the moderates. The government which will replace this one next year or thereon after will be still more agreeable to

them. The Filipinos may rest assured that the American people are anxious to see them satisfied with their situation. The Americans themselves have good reason to be pleased with the attitude of their wards on the other side of the Pacific.—Globe Democrat.

A canvass of the State of Nebraska made by local grain men brings forth one estimate of 75,000,000 another of 80,000,000 and still another of 100,000,000 bushels of corn. The Burlington railway officials incline to the belief that the state will harvest and crib 100,000,000. The acreage planted was 8,000,000. If ten bushels per acre is cribbed that would give the state the 80,000,000 bushels. As the "pat" of the entire commonwealth is thirty-six bushels, ten bushels per acre would seem to be conservative. If fifteen bushels per acre should be cribbed, and that would be only forty-one per cent of a full average crop, the state would have 120,000,000, but few seem to believe that the yield will be so large.—Breder's Gazette.

Harry Trower, Kansas City, has purchased 12,000 cows from ex-Governor Don Luis Tarraxas, in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico. The cattle were bought for the recently organized big land and cattle syndicate of which William Humphrey, Ashland Neb., is president.

Mexican ranch consists of 12,000,000 acres and gangs of men are already at work inclosing this vast tract within a ring fence. When the fences are in place 750 Hereford bulls are to be sent to the ranch from Nebraska and put with the 12,000 cows. The cows bought are mostly grade Herefords.
