I recommend that from 12 o'clock noon to 3 o'clock p. m., on Thursday, September 19, 1901, the business houses of the city be closed, and that the citizens, at 2 o'clock, p. m., gather at the Baptist church, then go to the will of God, and hope and strength in the services of the hour.

From this time on the eggs will keep better if the cocks are separated from the hens. After the breeding season is over there is no object gained in keeping the cocks.

As milk readily absorbs any bad odors, it should be kept covered in a cool place. Strain through a wire strain first, and then through three thicknesses of book muslin or cheese cloth.

When fowls have been having a free run, if cooped up closely for a few weeks the effect will be very noticeable, unless more than average good treatment is given the hens will cease to lay, the cocks lose their natural vigor and gallantry, lice will generate and serious losses be inevitable result.

Hon. Peter Janson writes: "Nabaska will have between 70,000,000 and 80,000,000 bushels of corn. Scarcely any feeding will be done. There will be lots of rough feed of all kinds and young stock will be carried over. I do not think that over 150,000 sheep will be fed in the state.—Breeder's Gazette.

Frightened by hearing terrific thunder for the first time, a splendid young race horse worth \$2,500, died in convulsions at Butte, the other day. It was bred in California, the horse had never heard a thunder peal before and had never seen a flash of lightning, says the correspondent of the Helena Record.

It is a mistake to sell the young hens because they cease to lay while moulting. One year old hens that moult early are among the best winners of the best plan is to give them good treatment until the progress is over and then if well fed and cared for a supply of eggs may be assured through the winter.

All things considered one of the quickest and easiest ways of fumigating the poultry house is to wash out the nest, close the doors and windows tight, burn a pan of sulphur and tobacco in it, letting it stand closed about four hours, then open up well so as to ventilate thoroughly before permitting the fowls to go inside.

The food of the laying hens should be varied every few days or still better mixed in each feed. At this time wheat can be made the principal grain food using oats, barley, buckwheat and sorghum seed to make up a variety. Very little corn should be given unless it is desired to fatten for market. Good thrift is better than excessive fat.
