EDITORIAL HASH

Moral suasion is a lovely thing;
but the swift kick is often quickest
to achieve results.

the downcast eye and the modest
blush that repute men up for the
branding iron.

because he had a private but reliable
tip that this continent was here.
It would be interesting to know
who gave the great navigator the tip.

The census report just received
shows the death rate in Oregon to
be a little less than ten per cent,
about the lowest of any state in the
United States. The average for the
whole country is approximately 15
per cent. Portland is about the
average of the state and probably of
the other cities in the state—9.5 per
cent. Both San Francisco and Los
Angeles are 20 per cent. San Jose
is 24 per cent. San Diego is 22 per
cent. The highest is Savannah, Ga.,
31 per cent. In Oregon in 1900
there were 3,396 deaths. Of these
382 died under one year of age.

It falls to few men to experience
as much during the twenty-one
years succeeding their graduation
as has crowded the "strénuous life"
of President Roosevelt during the
period since he left Harvard Uni-
versity. Though young in years he
is old in experience. He has
served as Assemblyman, Police
Commissioner and Governor in the
state of New York, president of the
Civil Service Commission, Assistant
Secretary of the Navy, Colonel
of a Rough Rider regiment in active
service and finally as Vice Presi-
dent. Throughout his career,
though he has made enemies, as a
man of his strong characteristics is
bound to do, no hint of corruption
or double-dealing has ever stained
his record.

Socialists are now kept busy ex-
plaining the difference between
socialism and anarchy. They
should have the benefit of the doubt;
there is a difference. While social-
ism, in one light, is a primary de-
partment, graduates from which
enter the school of anarchy, in
another sense it possesses no relative
part of anarchy. Socialism, it must
be admitted, has a tendency to
make its advocates, as Czolgosz
states he became, "morose and en-
vious," and in this frame of mind
one is very liable, especially if his
brain suffers somewhat under the
influence of surroundings and deep
contemplation, to be converted to a full-
fledged anarchist. Then 'tis but a
step; otherwise, it is a much longer
stride. There are many believe in
socialist ideas as presented by the
orators of that party of the present
day, but they keep up courage and
have faith in gaining their ends.
They believe in government in fact
too much government and only
those who are made despondent
with their condition in life from
pursuing socialist paths are in
danger of seeking a state of lawless
confusion. Hence we find not a
few socialists becoming anarchists,
but not vice versa.—Ex.

Butter and Eggs Short.

"Notwithstanding the great ex-
pansion of the dairy business in
this region of late, the supply of
butter is not equal to the demand,
and Eastern butter is finding its
way to this market again. Last
year there was no eastern butter
brought here, but the long spell of
dry weather the last summer had
the effect of lessening the output,
and the population of the city has
been increasing rapidly, consequent-
ly Eastern butter will have to be
imported. Last Spring, when the
supply of butter began to exceed the
demand, a large quantity—some
100,000 pounds—was bought up and
put in cold storage. This has been
nearly all disposed of already, and
as the present output of the dairies
is not enough to supply the demand
the shortage will have to be made
good by Eastern butter.

Eggs of late have been scarce, and
several carloads have been sent from
the East, but none of them have
come here, so far as know. With
eggs at 25 cents a dozen in Portland
and 16 cents per ton in Chicago,
there is a good margin for importers.
After harvest, the output of eggs
always increases, and it is said that
there will be more chickens engaged
in laying eggs in this section this Fall
than ever before. It is highly prob-
able that Oregon should produce
enough eggs and butter for home
consumption, at least.—Oregonian.

DRESSING A FISH.

The quickest and best method for
Small Ones.

At this season of the year many are
camping or living in summer cottages
by lake or ocean. To those who can
take with them a competent cook
the knowledge of a quick method of clean-
ing fish may not be of any practical
use; but the real campers are those who
catch their fish, and clean and cook,
as well as eat them. To these, although
the catching and the eating may be
most enjoyable, the cleaning is always
a bugbear.

The quickest and best method for
dressing all small fish perch, bass
and croppies, is as follows: Put the
fish in a large pan and pour over them
scalding hot water. Shake them out
in this for a moment, then pour it off
and rinse the fish in cold water. Now
with an old pair of scissors cut off the
fin and tail. With a sharp knife cut
off the head and cut through the skin
of each fish in a straight line down the
back. Beginning on each side of this
incision, quickly pull off the scales
with your fingers. Some epicures prefer the scales
left on, but if they had the scales to
scrape off, they would perhaps change
that opinion. It really makes very lit-
tle, if any, difference in the flavor.

The fish are now ready to be opened
and cleaned as usual. Each one should
then be washed thoroughly, inside and
out, in cold water; wiped dry; rolled
in corn meal or flour; seasoned well
with salt and pepper and laid on a clean
platter. They may be set aside in a
cool place or fried at once. When fried
brown and not too fast in hot butter
and lard, one part of each, the flesh is
firm, crisp and delicious.

Wash the fins and knives which have
been used with plenty of hot water and
soap. After the hands have had a good
scrubbing, if they still have a fishy odor,
as they sometimes will, wash them in
a little cold water, in which has been put
a half teaspoonful of listerine, which
will entirely remove the odor.

A very nice thing for the woman who
fishes and is the possessor of a delicate
skin is a fishing collar. She may wear
a veil, big hat and old gloves, but the
hot sun and the reflected glare from
the water will get at her neck, do the
best she can. And a red neck is de-
testable above all things. Take any
light wash goods, linen, calico or ging-
ham, and cut from it a fishing collar
at least three inches high. Starch it
very stiff. Fasten ribbons to the ends
and take it along the next time you go
fishing.—Good Housekeeping.
