**High Prices Rule at Dawson.**

In Dawson there are five sawmills employing 177 men, with pay rolls amounting to \$40,000 a month and a total capacity of 85,000 feet of lumber. There are also two shingle mills that turn out 65,000 pieces a day, a lat mill of 20,000 daily capacity, besides planing mills, a sash and door factory and a furniture factory. One of the large contracts this year was with the government, which required 1,000,000 feet. The same prices are paid that ruled last year. The best matched lumber brings \$125 per 1,000; dressed \$115 rough common, \$90. Logs delivered at the mill bring \$34 per 1,000 feet. From these figures it can be readily seen that the market conditions are favorable and are all that the mill men could wish.

A recent bulletin of the federal census shows that there are over \$13,000,000 of capital invested in the manufacturing concerns of Portland, and in all the cities and towns in the state combined over \$32,000,000. The interesting point in this information is that the manufacturing growth of our state has only covered a period of a few years, and is due to the agitation of the local newspapers which created a sentiment that led to the creation of a home manufacturing club in Portland with a membership throughout the state. Now the value of all the manufactured products is \$46,000,000, indicating that millions are now paid annually to the producers of raw material, and the millions more to the wage earners employed in the factories.

In his executive capacity President Roosevelt is setting a good example to white House employees by going to work every morning for six days in the week at 8 o'clock. Not only is it a good example to White House employees, and more particularly to that class of individuals whose greatest effort is to see how little work they can do and hold the positions.
