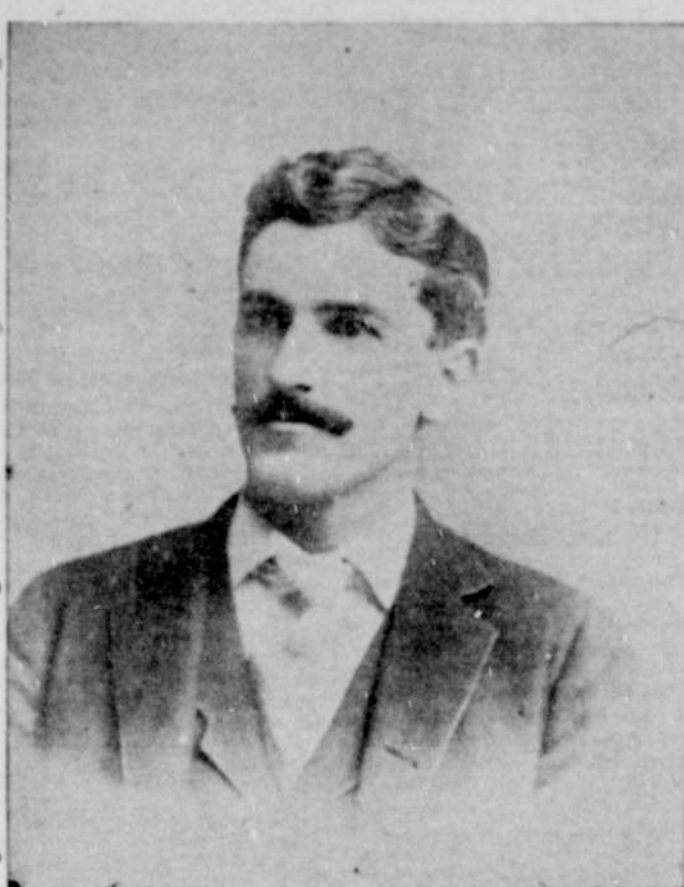

HAVANA SEWER CONTRACT.

Bid of McGivney and Rockey, of Jersey
City, Accepted.

Havana, Nov. 12.—The municipal
council of Havana has decided by a
vote of 10 to 8 to accept the bid of S.
P. McGivney and R. T. Rockey, of
Jersey City, which is \$10,393,015, for
the Havana sewerage and paving con-
tract. Considerable feeling was man-
ifested during the session over the
circulation of a pamphlet insinuating
that the McGivney-Rockey bid was
really the bid of the engineers' de-
partment.

The papers assert that Senor Tam-
ayo, secretary of state and govern-
ment, has been challenged to fight a
duel by a member of the Union Club
whom, it is said, Senor Tamayo and
a friend assaulted at the close of the
recent banquet given by the Cuban
society to the visiting Chileans.

Senor Tamayo was detained by the
police but ultimately released by the
civil governor.

The Democratic party has adopted
General Bartolome Maso as its can-
didate for the presidency of Cuba.

OMNIBUS HELD UP.

Bold Robbery Within the Limits of a North
Dakota Town.

Valley City, N. D., Nov. 12.—
While an omnibus was on its way to
North Valley City tonight it was held
up by masked men. Half of the pas-
sengers aboard were robbed, losing
money and other valuables to the
amount of about \$400. Lawyer
Combs, who was riding with the driv-
er, jumped from his seat in the dark-
ness, ran back to the nearest house
and telephoned to the police. By the
time the officers arrived, however, the
robbers had escaped with their booty.

There is no clue to their identity.
The hold up took place within the
city limits and was a bold piece of
work.

Athens, Nov. 12.—A terrible gun
accident occurred yesterday on the
British battle ship Royal Sovereign,
outside of the Osetoko harbor. An
artilleryman forgot to close the hatch
before the gun was fired. One officer
and six artillerymen were killed or
died, the bodies being terribly mutil-
ated, and the captain and 13 sailors
were seriously injured.

American Schooner Seized.

London, Nov. 12.—The Exchange
Telegraph Company has received a
dispatch from Lisbon announcing
that a Portuguese gunboat has seized
the American schooner Nettie and
Lottie at Horta, Island of Fayal, in
the Azores, for clandestinely convey-
ing 26 emigrants who were trying to
avoid military service.

Italy's New Battle Ship.

New York, Nov. 11.—The battle-
ship Brenetto Bren has been suc-
cessfully launched at Castelmare, in
the presence of the King and Queen,
says the Naples correspondent of the
Herald. On the arrival of the Queen
she was presented with a magnificent
bouquet. Her Majesty performed the
christening ceremony, and as the bat-
tle-ship glided into the water the
ships of the Mediterranean squadron
fired a royal salute. The Brenetto
Bren is one of the largest ships of the
Italian Navy, having a displacement
of 13,000 tons. Her launching weight
was 7000 tons.

Gave the Officers the Slip.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 12.—Three of
the escaped federal convicts have been
located in a building in Shorey, a
suburb of Topeka, ever since Satur-
day. The police were notified and
they made a hurried trip out. How-
ever, the men had become suspicious,
and eluded the police by leaving
about 10 minutes before the police
arrived. A negro woman noticed the
convicts and her husband gave the
alarm.

ORDER OF WASHINGTON.

Charges Against Supreme Officers Not Sus-
tained and Everything is O. K.

Seattle, Nov. 7.—Supreme Presi-
dent W. W. Terry, Supreme Secre-
tary J. L. Mitchell, Supreme Cap-
tain Paul Pfendner and T. B. Mc-
Devitt, of the Order of Washington,
have answered charges made by John
R. Parker, president of the local
union, regarding the organization.

The supreme officers were indorsed
in every possible manner by the mem-
bers of the union, and whatever dissen-
t there might have been, disappeared
when President Parker threw down
his badge and withdrew from the
meeting. A unanimous vote of con-
fidence in the head officers was ex-
pressed by the Seattle union, and
peace reigns, with the exception that
Parker is to be tried under impeach-
ment proceedings.

The Order of Washington has un-
ions in Oregon, Washington, Idaho
and Montana, and has a membership
of over 12,000. The supreme officers
are leading citizens of Portland. It
is incorporated under the laws of
Oregon, and was the first society
authorized to do insurance business
in Washington under the new law.

PACIFIC REGALIA COMPANY.

Business of This Home Industry Requires a
Larger Factory and More Capital.

Portland, Nov. 6.—The Pacific Re-
galia Company, of Portland, has been
re-incorporated by Paul Pfendner, J. L.
Mitchell, John S. Pinney, T. B.
McDevitt and May Pfendner, with
\$50,000 capital stock. The company
manufactures badges, buttons, regalia
and lodge supplies of all kinds. The
factory now operates 30 machines of
various kinds and will be still further
enlarged to accommodate its growing
business.

West Point Rules Changed.

Washington, Nov. 11.—Secretary
Root has issued an order changing the
regulations relative to admission to
West Point so that the academic
board may appoint candidates who are
enforcing them to pass the mental ex-
amination prescribed by the depart-
ment.

Preparing the New Canal Treaty.

Washington, Nov. 11.—Lord Pen-
cance, the British Ambassador, had a
half-hour's talk with Secretary Hay
in regard to preparation of the new Hay-
Pancettafe treaty. It is expected.
In view of the progress that has been
made, that the convention may be
concluded the latter part of next
week.

Formal Dinner at White House.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The presi-
dent and Mrs. Roosevelt gave their
first formal dinner at the White
House tonight, when a company of
18 persons was assembled in the fam-
ily dining room, which was beauti-
fully adorned with white chrysanthem-
ums. The guests included Secretary
and Mrs. Hitchcock, Admiral
Dewey, Colonel Sanger, Assistant
Secretary of War and Mrs. Sanger;
Mr. and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid; Mr.
and Mrs. Brooks Adams, of Boston;
Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Rockhill, Com-
mander and Mrs. Cowles and Miss
Roosevelt.

Carter Has More Evidence.

Leavenworth, Kan., Nov. 11.—Ob-
erlin M. Carter has been notified of
the granting of a civil trial in the
United States Circuit Court in Chi-
cago. Colonel L. D. Carter, L. Stanton
Carter and Horace Stone, a Chicago
attorney, have been here in consul-
tation with the prisoner, gathering
information for the approaching trial.
The purpose is to try at this trial to
introduce evidence which Captain
Carter asserts was excluded at the
court martial.

NEWS OF THE STATE

TEMP OF INTEREST FROM ALL
PARTS OF OREGON.

Commercial and Financial Happenings of Im-
portance—A Brief Review of the Growth
and Improvement of the Many Industries
Throughout Our Thriving Commonwealth
—Latest Market Report.

The Roseburg water company's ex-
tensive improvements are nearing
completion.

The St. Helens school district will
issue \$3,500 in school bonds to build
a new school house.

The roads of Wasco county are
vastly improved by reason of the
adoption of wide-tire wagons.

The Salem Automobile Co. has been
incorporated to operate automobile
lines between Salem and suburbs.

Nineteen members of the Oregon
City militia company were court-
martialled for neglect of duty.

County Commissioner Young, of
Clatsop county, was in Astoria last
week, and reports that the county saw
mill is in place and will at once be-
gin operations. The break in the dike
is being repaired by a force of men.

The Sumpter Lumber company's
new 45 horsepower engine has been
installed at the saw mill at Sumpter,
and all three engines started up last
week and are working satisfactorily,
both in the saw mill and the planing
mill.

The Chisholm logging camp near
Knappa, has closed down for the win-
ter, after having cut the body of tim-
ber it has been working on for several
months. It will start up again in the
early spring on a body of timber in
the same vicinity.

The lumber business of the Oregon
Commercial company, at Huntington,
has increased to such an extent that
the capacity of their saw mill is not
sufficient to supply the demand for
the product. The capacity of the plant
will be doubled as soon as the machin-
ery can be purchased, and machinery
will also be installed for another large
planing mill.

The normal school building at
Weston is nearing completion.

Klamath Falls has six cases of
smallpox. The public schools are
closed.

Grants Pass is considering the pro-
hibition of bicycle riding on the side-
walks within the city limits.

George A. Forbes has been engaged
as physical director of the Monmouth
normal school. Prior to his coming
to Oregon he was at the Berea college,
in Kentucky.

A contract has been let by the
school teachers and clerks who have
filed on land in the south end of
Lincoln county, to build 18 cottages
and 10 miles of fence on their prop-
erty.

Cattle feeding has begun at Butter
creek. About 4,300 are being fed,
more than ever before in the history
of that section. The condition of
the cattle is much better than usual
at this season.

TEN BURNED TO DEATH.

Nine Men and a Woman Lost Their Lives,
and Others Also May Have Perished.

Hurley, Wis., Nov. 8.—The Klondike
theatre, owned by Edward Le-
clair, caught fire early today, while
most of the inmates were in bed,
and the wooden structure was a mass
of fire in a flash. Nine men, and one
woman are missing, and there may
be others who have lost their lives in
the fire.

The building was a structure 125
feet long, three stories high and 50
feet wide, and valued at \$10,000. It
was occupied by 25 people, consisting
of the Leclair family and a stock com-
pany who gave a vaudeville entertain-
ment six nights a week. On the first
floor was the auditorium, barroom,
gambling rooms, dressing rooms,
kitchen, dining room, stage and pro-
prietor's bedroom. On the second
floor were the boxes and a number
of bedrooms. The third floor was
partitioned into sleeping apartments.

The fire is thought to have been
caused by the explosion of an oil stove
in the proprietor's bedroom. When
the alarm was sounded the flames had
cut off exit by the stairway. The only
remaining exit was through the side
and front windows. Some of the
women crawled through the side win-
dows, dropped to the adjoining build-
ing and reached the ground in safety
with slight injuries.

HAD STOLEN BANK NOTES.

Arrested at a St. Louis Hotel After They
Had Tried to Pass the Bills.

St. Louis, Nov. 8.—The police have
in custody at the Four courts a man
and woman suspected of complicity
in the robbery of an express car on
the Great Northern railway, near
Wagner, Mont., July 3, last, when
the safe was blown open with dynamite
and a consignment of unsigned
notes for the National bank of
Helena, Mont., amounting to be-
tween \$50,000 and \$100,000 was stolen.

Of this amount, \$8,500 in new
notes of the Helena bank were recov-
ered, having been found in the pos-
session of the man and woman, who
were registered at the Laclede Hotel
as Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Rose. They
arrived at the hotel last Friday and
announced that they would prob-
ably stay several weeks.
