EDITORIAL HASH

How about the city election? Are there going to be candidates enough for the several offices.

Hon. Binger Herman, United States Commissioner of the general and office, has made his annual report and in it says that 15,962,796 acres of public land were disposed of during the last fiscal year, an increase of 2,108,908 over the previous year. The net surplus from land and forest administration is \$3,548,442.

The county court has been inspecting bridges the past week or so, and we hereby give them a cordial invitation to come to Seio and take a look at the bridge in this city, which has done service a good many years without care, inspection or repairs. It's somewhat twisted but still stands the racket. It was the cause of the county treasury being swelled just \$10 the other day.

The completion of the count of the United States by race shows that the whites are more than holding their own. Some of the earlier figures by states made public a few weeks ago indicated that in parts of the country the negroes were growing slightly faster than the white population, but the count from the entire country which is now completed, tells a different story.

E. L. Smith, of Hood River, gives some convincing testimony in favor of the policy of spraying. He gathered 529 boxes of apples in his orchard of 4-year old trees—trees that had been set three years, says the Hood River Glacier. In the 529 boxes he found less than one boxful of wormy apples. Beyond the ravine from this orchard a neighbor picked 100 boxes from trees the same age. The neighbor did not spray his trees and about two-thirds of his apples are wormy. Mr. Smith sprayed his orchard six times in the season.

There is a bare possibility that some of the "settlers" who have been taking up valuable timber land in this county under the homestead act, may have an opportunity to face Uncle Sam with his war paint on before long. There is quite a difference in taking up a homestead and living on it according to law and living in town and going out once or twice a year and sleeping on the land. Since competition has become so strong for good timber the mill men are turning everyone to get hold of the valuable timber land, and if they can show the government where fraud has been committed, and get the matter investigated and the patents set aside the land is again subject to entry, and then the mill men can get men to take it up under the timber act and although they do not comply with the law in every respect they do a little better than the homesteader who never makes a home on the land more than one night at a time, and perhaps not that.

The annual report of the United States Treasurer, Hon. Ellis H. Roberts, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, contains some stupendous figures. The total net receipts of the government were \$587,683,387, and an increase of \$20,444,485 over the preceding year, and the highest ever recorded. The total disbursements amounted to \$509,967,353, which have been exceeded only during the civil war, and in 1899. The gold reserve of \$150,000,000 has been maintained without difficulty by the conversion of Gold coin and bullion from the general fund. So greatly in excess of his needs are Uncle Sam's present receipts, that when Secretary of the Treasury, Gage, learned that the receipts for one day amounted to \$1,081,444 over expenses he feared that the finances of the country would be disturbed by so great a drain on the circulating medium and he immediately began to purchase bonds and so reduce the national debt, and at the same time turn the currency back into circulation. The excess of receipts over expenditures for the month of October ran considerably over \$9,000,000.
