Pioneer of 1851 Passes Away.

Mrs. Caroline Shelton, wife of the late H. H. Harvey Shelton, last December 10, at the age of 69 years, after a lingering illness of several months duration. She had been a resident of Oregon for fifty years.

Mrs. Harvey Shelton was an Oregon pioneer of 1851. She was born in Jackson county Missouri, Nov. 18, 1832, and when a child moved with her parents from Missouri to Texas, and returned with them in 1851 to Missouri, residing there until 1851, when she crossed the plains with her parents and their family, and settled on a farm near Scio. She married Harvey Shelton, August 18, 1852, and resided on his donation claim near Scio until 1881, moving that year to Scio, residing here until his death, Aug. 21, 1893.

Seven boys and two girls, the two oldest when young, and the surviving children are Mrs. Mary C. Crane, R. Shelton, H. L. G. L. and E. C. Shelton of Scio, M. E. Shelton of Heppner Oregon, and Mrs. Isabelle Yarbrough of Heppner Oregon.

Four of her brothers and three sisters survive her, Mrs. Kate Morris of Tygh Valley, Oregon, Mrs. Susan Bateman of Huntsville Wash., Mrs. Lou Phillips of Dayton, Wash., Perry and Newton Thomas, of Idaho, Marion and William G. Thomas of Kodiak, Alaska.

She united with the missionary Baptist church in Oregon many years ago and was a member of this church at the time of her death, and she lived a true Christian life and was loved and respected by all who knew her.

Funeral services were held in the Baptist Church Monday morning at 10 o'clock conducted by Rev. W. H. Latourrette of McMinnville, and interment was made in Franklin Butte cemetery, near the city, the remains being followed by their last resting place by a large concourse of friends and heartbroken relatives.
