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EDITORIAL HASH

The most beautiful place to live in the United States is Marion, Iowa according to reports received by the Marine Hospital service from 1,900 cities and towns having a population of 1,000 or over. Marion has a population of 4,100 and there were only six deaths in 1900, making a death rate of the phenomenal low figure of 1.40 per 1,000. The average death rate in all the cities and towns was 17.17. It appears from the compilation of the Marine Hospital service that the state having the best record for health last year was North Dakota, with a death rate of only 6.35 per 1,000 population. By far the most beautiful of the populous states, however, was Iowa, the death rate being 11.17.

The official records of the gold commission's office at Dawson, where export certificates for all gold leaving the country must be obtained, show that the gold shipments from Dawson for September amounted to \$3,000,000. This brings the total for the last four months to \$21,600,000.

Adjutant General Curtis's report gives the casualties in the Phillip islands for three years at 115 officers and 2,378 men killed and 192 officers and 2,500 men wounded. This does not include those who died from diseases or in consequence of wounds and exposures.

He was a man of great industry and good habits, and leaves many friends to sincerely mourn his death. A wife and two children, Mrs. D. O. Woodworth and Miss Lena Marshall, of Albany, survive. The deceased was an original member of the A. O. U. W. of Albany, and a member of the Odd Fellows—Democrat.
