Lowest Lying Land in England.

The "Fens," which occupies the northern half of Cambridgeshire, the southeastern corner of Lincolnshire, and parts of Norfolk, Suffolk, Huntington and Northampton, extending 50 miles from north to south, and 20 miles in its greatest breadth, and covering an area of 750,000 acres, is the lowest land in this country. The surface of the "Fens" is eight feet below the level of the North sea, varying from four feet to 16 feet below the level of high-water mark.—The Hills.

The latest story of a wonderful gold find in Alaska is of a lake whose bed is literally paved deep with gold dust. The lake is 1,000 yards long, 400 yards wide and 150 feet deep. It is fed by a stream from a glacier, and its outlet is a little stream two feet deep, but of incredible swiftness. The assay of the sand which a seapartner brought to Seattle recently showed \$5 to \$10 a cubic yard, and on this basis a man alone could take out \$10,000 a year.

The big white moose recently shot in the Maine woods by Mr. Sargent of Bradford has greatly interested naturalists as well as sportsmen. It is the only white moose ever seen in Maine, and very few have ever been heard of elsewhere. The naturalists say it is, of course, not strange that there should be an albino moose, resulting from a freak of nature, as white deer and other albino game animals are not uncommon. But white moose are a great rarity.
