"GRAFT MEASURES."  
Senator Percy R. Kelly has never been charged with voting for a graft measure. His record in the legislature is a commendable one and fully appreciated by the voters of Linn county. He will be elected by a routing majority.—Albany Herald.

The logical inference from this paragraph is that "graft measures" were introduced in the senate by some body. But if none were introduced, then Senator Kelly would deserve no credit for not voting for them. If "graft measures" were introduced in the senate, the people are interested in knowing if Senator Kelly voted against them. If he simply failed to vote for these grafts, he did only a part of his duty. He should have raised his eloquent voice, exerted his great abilities and registered his emphatic protest against them.

Did he do this? If so, let the Herald name the "graft measures" against which he voted. The senate journal records the significant fact that Senator Kelly was absent from roll-call one hundred and ninety-eight times during the session of 1901. There were thirty-three legislative days in that session. This makes an average of six times a day. The journal shows also that he was absent upon the final reading of seventy-three bills. It is not quite possible that some of those "graft measures" mentioned by the Herald might have been voted upon in Senator Kelly's absence? This was in 1901. The senator had already had two years experience as a senator. He was chairman of the Judiciary committee, through whose careful scrutiny all measures, grafts and otherwise, must pass before the senate could well act upon them. No man was in a better position than he to detect and expose those "graft measures."

Did he detect them? Did he expose them? If so, will the Herald please enumerate them? If he did not detect them, he was certainly lacking in capacity. If he knew the fraud lurking in those "graft measures," he was surely unfaithful of his duty to his constituents in not denouncing them. The Herald has negatively admitted the presence in the senate of "graft measures." It is now "up to the Herald to say, whether Senator Kelly was lacking in capacity or lacking in duty.
