Death of Ashby Pierce.

Ashby Pierce died at his home in Albany Sunday morning after an illness of some time.
He was a pioneer of 1847 and for many years a prominent man in the affairs of this part of Oregon.
He was born June 30, 1821, in Harrison county, Ind., and came to Oregon across the plains in 1847, one of the first to locate in this part of Oregon. He was married in 1850 to Susan Reed, who died a few years ago.
He took an active part in the up-building of the valley, particularly in early days. Besides other property he owned a block on First street occupied by Thos. Hopkins and others, and had an interest in the building occupied by the Herald.
The only relatives left by the deceased are a sister, Mrs. Crothers, of this city, and a sister in the East aged 86 years. Mr. Pierce before his death conveyed his property to the Universalist church. This includes the Albany church which he erected at his own expense and the first street block.
The funeral service was held at Pierce Memorial church at 1:30 o'clock, Rev. Kennedy preaching the sermon.—Democrat.
