Oscar Pomeroy erected his new barn the past week, and now has it covered and sided up.

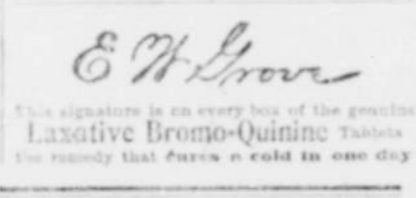
Hay cutting is now in full blast with a beautiful crop to the farmers credit.

### TRACY TOLD THE TRUTH.

Merrill's Dead Body Has Been Found Near Clatskanie.

TACOMA, July 15.—A Chelalis special in the Evening News says Superintendent Westcott, of the state reform school, and Don W. Bush have returned here, and confirm the story of the finding of the body of the escaped convict, Dave Merrill, who was killed by his pal, Harry Tracy. The body is undoubtedly that of Merrill, and he was killed at Clatskanie, Saturday morning, June 21. The body was found by Mrs. Mary Wagner and her 12-year-old son, of Napa, yesterday afternoon, who will claim the reward of \$275. Three 30-08 Winchester shells were found, one behind a tree by the roadside and two about ten feet from the corpse. The incident is that he fired the first shot from behind the tree, and then completed the assassination of his dying pal and brother in law.

### Another Pioneer Departed.

William Shelton, who died at his home in Jordan, ten miles east of Seio, July 4, 1902, was born in Patrick county, Virginia, August 15, 1819. When a boy he moved with his parents to Missouri and was married to Miss Rebecca Jones, January 19, 1845. He then moved to California and remained two years and returned to Missouri. From there he crossed the plains to Oregon in 1847, and all settled near his place. He had six brothers and six sisters, two brothers and two sisters deceased. The surviving ones are A. M. Shelton, Lee Shelton, Hanson Shelton, James Shelton, of Albany, Charlotte Thomas, Mary E. Hunt, and Mrs. J. W. Gaines, of Laconia. He was the father of seven children, two boys and five girls. Mrs. T. A. Richardson, Mrs. Henry Phillips, Mrs. W. B. Fryette, of Baker City, and A. J. Shelton, of Arlington, survive him.

He was one of our best citizens, being a moralist and just man in all his dealings. He was a member of the Missionary Baptist church and a member of the Grange. Interment was made in the Jordan cemetery on July 24, the remains being followed to their last resting place by a large number of relatives and friends. One more of our pioneer fathers has passed away.
