A complete but unofficial abstract of the vote for Governor at the June election has been compiled from the records in the hands of the several County Clerks. It shows Chamberlain plurality to be 276, in stead of 256, as heretofore supposed. The vote was: Chamberlain, 41,857; Furnish, 41,581; Hunsaker, 31,852; Ryan, 3771; total, 95,652. About 2300 of those who cast ballots failed to mark their ballots so as to express a choice for Governor.

Many Land Owners.

Over 100 Albany people have timber claims in Klamath county and during the next two months will make final proof. They represent all classes of people, bankers, lawyers, doctors, merchants, and various crafts. They were lured by a responsible firm and have confidence in the value of the land. Occasionally you will hear some "surehead" raising a howl about the timber, claiming that it is worthless and valueless, but the people who have claims there and who personally inspected the land know better and are not worried by such reports. Stories of that character are sent out by timber speculators who want to buy the tract and think they can secure the holders. The people of Albany have confidence in Ed Dorgan and his associates, F. J. Devine and J. J. Collins.

Pulling Flax Galore.

The flax harvest is on in earnest. Several fields hereabouts are full of men, women and children pulling flax and binding it ready to be taken to the mill to be thrashed. The thrashing process differs from the regulation grain machines, and requires a thrashing machine which will get out the seed without injuring the straw, and also keep the straw straight in the hands. This machine is located in the flax mill, and the straw has to be taken from the field to the mill to be thrashed. After it is thrashed it is again taken to the flax and spread out to be retted. The whole process requires a good deal of time and lots of labor, and about 150 to 200 people are each year employed to care for and harvest the crop.

To Burn Oil.

As fast as it is possible the engines of the Southern Railway company are being converted from coal burners to oil burners. Last week the forty-ninth engine left the Oakland shops with new oil furnaces and others will follow at an average rate of perhaps one per week, and a little later it is expected that the work of alteration will progress very rapidly. Should the company desire to burn the matter, it would not be long until every engine could be remodelled into the new class, but work will only be done on the locomotives as they are taken to the shops. The use of oil has proved such a success that the use of coal will, ultimately, it is believed, be a thing of the past so far as railroad engines are concerned.

Many Tourists in Portland.

Seldom before in the history of Portland have there been so many Eastern tourists in the city as at the present, says the Oregonian. The hotels are all crowded with guests mostly from Eastern cities, some of them on pleasure bent, others looking about for locations and business openings. Many of these visitors were in evidence yesterday, some looking about the city and the different suburbs, others going on short trips up the valley and down the Columbia River. As yesterday was an ideal day, those who were able to get away from the city enjoyed themselves immensely, looking over the ripening grain fields and hop yards, and trying their luck in the sparkling trout streams.

Second Grand Annual Excursion.

The Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Co. will run their second Grand Annual Excursion from Albany Corvallis, Pullman, and all points west to Newport and return on Sunday, August 3, 1902. Trains will leave Albany at 7 a. m. Corvallis 7:30; Pullman 7:45 and returning leave Newport at 5:30, giving nearly six hours at the beach. Grand exhibitions by the Life Saving Crew, surf bathing and other attractions will make the event one long to be remembered.

A Few Papers.

Some 42,800 newspapers are published in the world, the United States comes first, and is far in advance of all other countries, with 19,870 papers. Great Britain ranks next with 6,050. In Russia there are only 734 newspapers, or one to every 270,000 people. The Petit Journal, of Paris, has a daily circulation of not less than 1,000,000 copies. The paper having the smallest circulation is the Imperial Review, published for the sole benefit of the Emperor of Australia. It is made up from the translations from all the principal items in European papers, and the daily edition is three copies.

The University of Oregon.

The University of Oregon will open its twenty-seventh session at Eugene, Wednesday, September 17. The outlook for the year seems at present very promising. A number of new men have been added to the faculty, all thoroughly fitted both by preparation and by experience for their work. The university buildings are being repaired and improved during the summer. The chemistry, gymnasium and Deady hall received special attention. Students intending to enter this fall are invited to correspond with the president relative to their work. Catalogues will cheerfully be sent on application.

Sprayed His Hops.

Julius Pincus, of Salem, who is operating the Myers and Schindler hop yards, was here the past week spraying the yards in an endeavor to free them of lice so that he could get all the hops possible, in view of the present advance in price of cured hops. There are very few lice on the yards.

Receives a Check For \$200.

Dr. J. A. Lamberson Monday received from the Moscoches a check for \$200, as the first annual disability payment on the policy carried by the doctor in that society. According to the rules of the order, the doctor will have no further dues or assessments to pay as long as he is disabled. Should he recover his health sufficient to resume his practice his dues and assessments will start again, but should he remain disabled he will receive \$200 annually until he receives the full payment of the policy.—Lamborn E. Has Leased The Mill.

G. W. Phillips has leased his half interest in the Seilo Loller Mill to H. Miller who will operate it in the future. Mr. Miller has operated the Mill during the past year under lease from Phillips & Gaines, but a few months ago he purchased Mr. Phillips' interest in the property, since which time he has had control under the old lease. He will make a specialty of buying grain, and will at times be found paying the top price for both wheat and oats.

Change in Ownership.

The drug firm of Peery & Peery is no more. M. M. Peery having disposed of his interest in the firm to E. C. Peery, who will conduct the business hereafter. Mark has not as yet decided just what line of business he will pursue, but will probably move away from Seilo. E. C. Peery has been identified with our people for a number of years and will have no trouble in retaining the business that the late firm has enjoyed for several years past.

For Two Girls.

A young man named Frank Carlson, aged 23 years, lies dead in a morgue at Portland, the result of a duel, fought with George Baldwin Saturday night. The fight was the outcome of a dispute over two girls, waitresses in a North Portland hotel. The melee was witnessed by the relatives and friends of both contestants. Carlson received a knock-out blow in the stomach from which he instantly died. Baldwin surrendered himself to the officers, and is out on \$1,500 bail.

A Stayton Business Change.

Yesterday afternoon E. C. Titus sold his furniture business to M. Streff who takes possession Aug. 11. Mr. Titus has been in business here since Aug. 1894, and has built up a good trade, now carrying one of the largest stocks of furniture in the county. Mr. Streff is one of Stayton's respected citizens, with the capital and ability to successfully carry on the business, and improve as occasion demands.—Stayton Mail.
