Harry Tracy, the Oregon outlaw, 55 dead. He was surrounded by a posse near Fellows, in eastern Washington, when a number of shots were exchanged Tuesday. Tracy was shot twice in one leg, one shot crushing both bones below the knee and the other entered the thigh. He fell but managed to make his way into the brush. A little after dark he placed a revolver in his temple and killed himself almost instantly. His body was found by a bloody trail to a wheat field near by. He had endeavored to stop the flow of blood and realizing that his capture was certain, ended his own murderous career. The body was brought to Sehome and buried in the prison cemetery Saturday at 2 p. m. Previous to his interment vitrol was placed on the face to destroy it, in order to prevent any attempt at stealing the body and placing it on exhibition.

Edward has survived his examination. Physically he was well able to endure the ceremony, and everybody is glad of it. He had waited 61 years for the occasion, and the gypsy had said he would never live through it. Besides, the duchesses, peeresses, ladies in waiting, and countesses and their gowns and jewels had all been prepared for the triumph, and the sorrow to have resulted from failure of opportunity to display it all would have been a source of untold anguish.

Signs of longevity. The primary conditions of longevity are that the heart, lungs and digestive organs, as well as the brain, should be healthy.
