Killed by Lightning.

He was in a small wooden house, about four feet from a large oak tree, under which was a lot of farm machinery, including himself, from the storm, when the electric current struck the tree and branched off into the house, hitting the unfortunate man on the forehead and passing clear through his body. He was found dead shortly afterwards by his little daughter, who had only left her father a few minutes before the bolt descended.

Many Under Contract.

As consequence the growers in this county see very little to be happy over just now. If the hops suffer no misfortune between now and picking time, those who sold at ten cents will get out with a fair profit on this year's operations, but when they read of the net proceeds pocketed by their brother growers in Lane county, they will be likely to speak harshly of their own lot.
