The Southern Pacific Railroad Company is making very extensive and satisfactory tests of the problem of burning oil on the engine of their system and are being so well pleased with the results that more engines are being equipped and great storage tanks are being placed along the line. The company has had these experiments going on for some time and have demonstrated that the burning of oil will greatly cheapen the cost of operating the system. In speaking of the enterprise the local official said that the fact that the road is being put in condition to use oil in the Pacific division shows that it is most practical. Below Dunsmuir, Calif., oil is being used extensively and it is found much cheaper than either wood or coal. As soon as the engines are equipped and the storage tanks are completed the line between Ashland and Dunsmuir will be operated with oil. Tanks are now being built at Ashland, Hornbrook, Eaglewood and Dunsmuir. Previous to this the company has found that wood was much cheaper than coal but the advent of oil and the extreme low figure at which it can be procured makes it a successful rival to these kinds of fuel.—Silvertonian.

An expert special agent of the division of manufactures of the Census Office has just finished an exhaustive report on the manufacture of electrical apparatus and supplies throughout the country in 1900. Summed up, the report shows that there are 680 establishments in operation, in which \$81,130,953 was invested. These gave employment to 46,890 wage earners, who received during the year, \$20,196,944 as compensation for their labor. The cost of material used in the manufacturing amounted to \$48,916,410, and the value of the products, including custom work and repairing, aggregated \$91,348,388.
