SCIO, LINN COUNTY, OREGON, OCTOBER 17, 1902

At the last session of congress a bill was passed authorizing all monies received from the sale of state lands should be used for irrigation in the several states. By this act the irrigation proposition becomes of national importance. It means much to the United States and more to the several states. Much arid land will become oases. Diversified farming and stock raising will be the result. A way to a new era of internal development and domestic expansion is opened, as great as any period of its magnificent past. To further this movement the National Irrigation Congress was organized, and the tenth annual meeting opened on Monday last at Colorado Springs, which promises to be the best and largest meeting ever held. There are no party lines, both democrats and republicans joining together and working for the best interests of the several states concerned.

If there is anything to be learned that will help in the matter of building good roads the people ought to know it and therefore a large attendance was desired. The session is near when good roads will be appreciated.

President Roosevelt continues his progress toward recovery and the second operation which took place on the 5th was in every way successful. It is greatly to the President's advantage that he has an excellent constitution and that he has not permitted even the exacting duties of his office to lead him into sedentary life which must have made his convalescence at least slow. That the President is gaining rapidly is shown by his active participation in the affairs of the country and his ability to confer with his cabinet and anthracite coal people.

A fact not generally known is the fact that the largest and oldest cherry tree in the state of Oregon stands within a few miles of Independence on the farm of B. F. Whiteaker, a pioneer. Several years ago a dispute arose and a metropolitan took the matter up, sent a representative to Independence and affirmed the assertion that Polk county is the home of the largest and oldest cherry tree in the state.

Eljah Wittfog, whose death occurred near Scio Oct. 7, 1902, was born in Dark county, Ohio, Oct. 15, 1812. In 1836 he was married to Miss Sarah Large and two sons were born to them. His wife having died he again married to Mrs. Elizabeth Argabrite, and five children blessed this union, all of whom survive him except one daughter. His wife preceded him to the other shore 42 years ago. He came to Oregon in 1863 and located in Linn county, where he remained 7 years, then went to Los Angeles, Cal., where he resided until 12 years ago when he again came to Oregon and located near Scio. He was very patient during his 7 weeks illness and spoke with great fortitude of coming death. He was a member of the Duquard church and a consistent christian. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Snyder and the remains were laid to rest in the Miller cemetery.
