## EDITORIAL.

Henry Dosh started for Japan Wednesday, where he will represent the manufactured products of forty-eight firms of Oregon at Osaka trade exhibit. Mr. Dosh is the right man in the right place.

It is by no means certain that Germany and England are not experimenting with the United States while shooting at Venezuela. If such is the case the war lords have set out to hunt trouble and will surely find it.

This should be paraphrased by the advertiser into, "It is goods that talk."

News of the death of Congressman Thomas H. Tongue, which occurred in Washington, D. C., Sunday at 12:30 p. m. was received in Scio with profound regret. Mr. Tongue has ably represented the first congressional district of Oregon for the past six years, and has made his impression upon national legislation since his incumbency. He was held in high esteem by his colleagues and had the confidence of the administration. Oregon will suffer irreparable loss by his death. He was chairman of the irrigation committee, which is rapidly assuming the importance of the committee on rivers and harbors, of which he was also a member. His place at the head of that committee meant much for the arid sections of this state. The loss of so efficient a worker, coming just at this time when the state is to send a new man to the senate, will greatly affect Oregon's interests at Washington.

### Tax Levy Made For Year.

The county court Saturday made the annual tax levy for state, county and school purposes. The total levy for all purposes is 19 mills, divided as follows: State, 6 mills; for public school purposes, 5 mills; current expenses of county, 3 mills; roads and bridge, 2.9 mills; special road tax under new law, 2 mills; indigent soldiers, 1.10 of a mill. The amount to be paid to the state this year is \$39,976 as against \$48,291 paid last year under the 7.4 mills which was levied last year. The levy for county and for roads and bridges is a little higher this year than it was last. The people will not complain when a little more care is expended on the public highways. The 19 mills gives Linn county one of the lowest levies in the state. The county is out of debt and her finances are in fine shape.

## The State Legislature.

Salem, Ore., Jan. 15.—The first ballot for United States Senator will occur next Tuesday. It will be cast tomorrow Fulton would receive approximately 30 votes and Cooper 20, and C. E. Wood the 17 Democratic votes. This leaves out of consideration Multnomah County, with its 19 votes, which are for neither Gear nor Fulton. Two are doubtful and two are absent.

The Multnomah delegation had a long conference tonight over proposed legislation for that county. The session lasted for nearly three hours. The delegation will introduce some 10 or a dozen measures at once. This does not mean that the members favor passage of bills, but simply that they wish to have the measures printed so as better to advise them. Among the bills are the following:

To rebuild Morrison street bridge and to issue \$300,000 bonds therefor. To secure fireboat. To secure ferry at Seaside. To reorganize Port at Portland Commission.

To increase authority of County Auditor. To make personal property tax a lien. The bills have already begun to flow in at a terrific rate.

Besides the customary resolutions about postage stamps, newspapers, investigating asylums, etc., some of them are:

In the Senate: To amend code, by Senator Miller to amend code, for health officer for each county, for consolidation of schools and for flat salaries for state officials. By Hunt to appropriate \$500,000 for the Lewis & Clark Exposition. By Crozier for direct primary election. In the House: By Malarky \$5,000 for exposition. By Orton creation office of commissioner of schools and for taxing liquor sold in dining cars, relating to taxation of corporations, license tax on foreign corporations. Gault, for reorganizing the State from working on Sunday. Bank regular hours for work for women in hotels. Following are the Linn county men selected on house committee: M. P. Powell chief clerk engineering committee, Sam Worrell committee clerk.

#### T. H. Tongue Dead.

Representative Thomas H. Tongue of the First Oregon Congressional District, in the presence of his daughter Bertha, and his secretary, Miss Roper, suddenly in his room at the Irvington, at 1:30 Sunday. A few minutes before he passed away he inhaled into unconsciousness, which without word, without any suffering, his son, Thomas H., Jr., did not reside with his father, but was notified of his approaching end, and had come to his father's bedside, but did not reach there until he had passed away. Death was due to acute indigestion, which superinduced paralysis of the heart. His Oregon home was at Hillsboro. #### The Bridges of Linn County.

Few people are aware or stop to think that Linn County has more than 3500 bridges within its limits, but such is the case. There are actually 3500 bridges in this county over 16 feet long, and some of these reach the enormous length of 640 feet. Forty of these are covered bridges, and the shortest covered bridge in the county is 30 feet long, the 640 foot bridge over the Santiam river. The cost to maintain these bridges is very large as they are nearly all wooden structures, and the life of such a bridge is but little more than a score of years, with deckings replaced much oftener. Under the road master, the first year 17 new bridges were constructed aggregating in length 599 feet. Forty-two of the old bridges received substantial repairs during the year and made partly new.

Aside from these, this county owns jointly with Marion county six large bridges which span the Santiam river and all are large costly structures.

The bridge question of this county is an important one as is the road question and are ones which must not be neglected or overlooked.
