### The Boy on the Farm.

The boy on the farm is lucky. He is better off than if he were born with a silver spoon in his mouth. His life is healthier, his morals cleaner, his pleasures sweeter than that of his city cousin. If the boy on the farm has an ounce of common sense he will stay on the farm until he is a grown man and continue right on staying until he is ready to get off the farm and off the earth. The business of farming is safer than any other business because it is more permanent.

There are farmers living all around you, boys, who have been on the same farm a quarter of a century and have made money. How many merchants are there in any of the towns of this country who can say the same? The farm laborer is better off than the city laborer. His \$20 per month is better than the clerk's, the policeman's and the merchant's \$60 per month. He does not lose as much time in the year, lives better, is more independent, and enjoys life more than any other hired man. The boy on the farm should grow to appreciate the dignity of farming. It is the oldest business on earth. It is a complicated business and the man who is successful farmer must have a long head and a level head. If he is an ignorant some one will soon get to own his farm and he will have to pay for the privilege of living on it. The boy on the farm should study soils. He should study the business of farming. He should know all about crops and how to handle them. He should study the science of breeding live stock. A good farmer knows more useful things than a college professor or even the editor of a newspaper, and a boy who has an ambition to be a good farmer should be proud of the fact that when he realizes his ambition he will be one of the broadest minded, most helpful beings on the face of the creation. A remarkable surgical operation was performed at the City Hospital, in St. Louis, on January 19, to save the life of Edward Spilker, aged 19, who had attempted suicide by shooting himself through the heart. An aperture was made at the wound, and between pulsations the wound in the heart was closed with three stitches. The bullet had also penetrated the apex of the left lung. A portion, an inch and a half square, was cut away, a heavy silk ligature tied about the lung, draining tubes being established and the chest cavity closed. The patient rapidly rallied, and it is believed he will recover.—Medford Mail.

Hon. Reed Smoot, a Mormon apostle, has been elected U. S. Senator, from Utah, and already some talk has been indulged in concerning his being elected. The constitution of the United States does not require any religious test for a senator, and because Mr. Smoot is a Mormon, is no reason he should not be seated, provided he is otherwise qualified. He is not an apologist, as was B. H. Roberts, who was denied a seat in Congress, and so far as we are able to see, is entitled to the seat to which he has been elected.

## SCIO PLANING MILL.

The Willamette Goes on a Tear.

Instead of gently gliding through the valley the Willamette Saturday was roaring through the beautiful Willamette, covering the fields and filling the basements of cities along the river. Coming up with a rush the rise was very sudden and unexpected, catching many along the river unaware. Here it reached 31.5 the fourth highest rise in the history of the river, having been exceeded only in 1867, 1881 and 1890. It is now at a standstill and a rapid fall is expected.

During the forenoon four of the piles on the north side of the big steel bridge in this city, nearest the pier fell, weakening that part of the approach, and at 10 o'clock thirty feet of the approach fell.

The S. P. bridge at Junction was washed out, stopping trains, but is now temporarily repaired ready for trains. At Astland some track was washed out, but has been repaired.

The west approach to the Jefferson wagon bridge was considerably damaged.

The Scattergood bridge took a tumble and disappeared under a stream, at least the two north bents, the new south bent remaining. This bridge has already cost the county nearly \$50,000.

Considerable loss of stock is reported at Albany. A number of Bryson's Park, across the Calapoosa, is the heaviest loser reported. His loss is 150 goats, 15 head of cattle and five horses, which were in the lower part of the park. Some goats and a few cows were gotten into his barn above high water. Chester Steels, across the Willamette lost 12 hogs and 2 sheep, and H. C. Chamberlain lost 12 hogs at his slaughter house.

The Stayton bridge went out during the night. It was owned jointly by Linn and Marion counties and cost about \$9,000.

The Oregonian bridge on the Santiam was so badly damaged as to stop trains and they come through Albany by way of the Lebanon branch and the Curvallis and Eastern.

None of the bridges on the C & E were damaged in amount to anything and the trains have been running.

The approach to the Lebanon bridge went out, and a small bridge over a creek near the city disappeared.

The Crawfordville bridge collapsed, a wreck, but did not go out. A logging bridge belonging to S. V. Hall, up the north fork of the Santiam was washed away, entailing a considerable loss.—Democrat.
