EVENTS OF THE DAY

GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF THE TWO HEMISPHERES.

Comprehensive Review of the Important Happenings of the Past Week. Presented in Condensed Form, Most Likely to Prove Interesting to Our Many Readers.

The coal strike commission has nearly completed its work.

The trial of Major Glenn is nearly over and it is likely the court will acquit him.

Marconi will charge one cent a word for the transmission of wireless messages across the ocean.

Teller has been elected to congress by Colorado Democrats, but the Republicans will not oppose it.

The house has passed the agricultural bill. It carries an appropriation of \$300,000 for free seeds.

The coal miners' convention, in session at Indianapolis, voted down a proposition to endorse socialism.

Brown is confident that he will soon be able to reach satisfactory terms with Great Britain and Germany.

Senator Mitchell was ill for several days the latter part of last week and unable to attend to his routine duties.

Great Britain has entered a protest against the Cuban reciprocity treaty, claiming it will hurt the sugar industry.

Ting Fuh Siang has been proclaimed emperor of China in opposition to the present ruler and will begin a war to kill off all foreigners.

After three years' delay, the treaty providing for the fixing of the Alaskan boundary, has been signed by the United States and Great Britain.

Severe earthquakes shook South Carolina and Georgia.

Governor Chamberlain has signed the Portland charter bill.

Recent say Venezuelan began the second fight at Fort San Carlos.

A driving snow storm in Central Kansas has demoralized business.

An explosion of dynamite in a tunnel at Pittsburg resulted in four deaths.

A wealthy Jersey city produce merchant was doped and robbed of \$11,000.

Ex-Governor Charles K. Ingersoll, of Connecticut, is critically ill. He is 81 years old.

The bill providing for a fire boat at Portland has been passed by both houses of the legislature.

Action has been brought in New York to have the famous "Flatiron" building declared a nuisance.

At Olympia Friday the vote for senator stood: Ankeny 55, Preston 44, Wilson 9, Turner 22, scattering 6, total 136.

The vote for senator at Salem Friday stood: Fulton 29, Geer 15, Wood 13, scattering 16, absent and paired 17, total 90.

It is said that President Roosevelt is turned against the admission of Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona because of a suspicion of jobbery.

Coal miners are demanding the government ownership of mines.

A blizzard in the western part of Colorado has blocked all railroad traffic.

Mild weather and free imports have caused the price of coal to drop slightly in New York.

An Illinois Central train ran into an open switch at Memphis, Tenn., fatally injuring three trainmen.

A Chicago & Great Western train was wrecked at Freeport, Ill., and three men killed and 15 others injured.

The agricultural appropriation bill carries \$5,238,860, an increase of \$29,000, but \$400,000 less than the estimates.

A movement has been started in Indianapolis to buy a residence to be presented to John Mitchell, president of the Mineworkers' union.

The number of striking garment workers in Vienna has increased to 19,000. It is expected that the employers will be obliged to capitulate.

Mayor Wells, of St. Louis, has suspended Patrick B. Fitzgibbon, the city registrar, who is charged with corruptly contracting for city printing and binding.

President Roosevelt will speak at the bi-centenary of John Wesley in New York on February 25.

The American Federation of Labor will begin a campaign in favor of child labor laws and the bill making eight hours a day's work on government contracts. It will investigate the charges of inhumanity to Porto Rican laborers in Hawaii.

The Spanish minister of marine began action in Edinburgh, Scotland, to recover \$375,000 from the Clydebank engineering and shipbuilding company because of the company's failure to deliver in contract time four torpedo boat destroyers which had been intended for use during the Spanish-American war.

GERMANS SHELL A PORT.

Fierce Engagement Between Three War Ships and Venetians.

Maricao, Venezuela, Jan. 23.—Three German warships, supposed to be the Panther, Vineta and Falke, began shelling the fort at San Carlos at 3:30 o'clock this morning. The fort returned the fire. The engagement was still in progress at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

The correspondent of the Associated Press, in a row boat, approached to within three miles of the fort at noon. The roar of the guns was terrific. The Panther appeared to be not more than 500 yards from the fort. The guns were being fired every minute. The fort could not be seen for the clouds of smoke, but it was plain that the Venezuelan gunners were answering the German fire splendidly and with great rapidity.

At 1 o'clock in the afternoon an explosion occurred, apparently in the fort, and a cloud of smoke covered part of the ramparts. A number of Indian fishermen were intercepted fleeing from the fort in their dug-out canoes. They reported that the smoke seen was from the burning village of San Carlos, which had been shelled by the German ships and was in flames.

The shelling of San Carlos has created much excitement among the German residents of this port, who have protested against the action of the warships.

SENATORS ELECTED.

Various States Whose Legislatures Have Agreed on Election.

Stone's Motion Final.
Jefferson City, Mo., Jan. 23.—The general assembly met in joint session today as formally declared former governor William J. Stone elected United States senator to succeed Hon. George G. Vest, whose term will expire next March. In honor of Mr. Vest, who has been a member of the national body since 1879, a salute of 13 guns was fired.

Clark Formally Chosen.
Little Rock, Ark., Jan. 23.—The legislature in joint session today elected ex-governor Clarke to succeed Senator J. K. Jones in the United States senate. The vote was: Clarke, 70; Jones, 55; Remett, (Rep.) 2.

Alger Represents Michigan.
Lansing, Mich., Jan. 23.—The legislature in joint session today ratified the election of Russell A. Alger as United States senator to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator James McMillan.

Hopkins for Illinois.
Springfield, Ill., Jan. 23.—Albert J. Hopkins' election to the United States senate today was confirmed by the two houses of the legislature in joint session.

Connecticut Sends Platt.
Hartford, Conn., Jan. 23.—The general assembly in joint session formally confirmed the re-election of Orville H. Platt as United States senator.

T. C. Platt from New York.
Albany, N. Y., Jan. 23.—The general assembly in joint session today formally elected Thomas C. Platt to the United States senate.

Fairbanks from Indiana.
Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 23.—United States Senator Charles W. Fairbanks was re-elected today in joint session of the legislature.

Hansbrough from North Dakota.
Bismarck, N. D., Jan. 23.—At the joint session of the legislature today H. C. Hansbrough was elected United States senator.

South Dakota Elects Kittredge.
Pierre, S. D., Jan. 23.—Both houses in joint session today elected Hon. A. B. Kittredge United States senator.

Americans May Prospect in Siberia.
Seattle, Jan. 23.—The right of Americans to prospect for gold and other minerals in Eastern Siberia has been granted. Within the area of 200,000 square miles bordering on Behring sea and the Arctic ocean given as a mining, trading and development concession to the Northwestern Siberia company, the same privileges have been extended to the American prospectors as Russians. The news of this concession on the part of the company came in a cablegram from John Riense, of this city, the American managing director of the corporation.

Would Exterminate Seals.
Washington, Jan. 23.—Representative Beldier today introduced a resolution providing for the extermination of his bill for the extermination of the Alaska seal herd, save 1,000 animals, preserved for breeding purposes, unless Great Britain gives assurance of cooperation in an effort to put a stop to pelagic sealing. He hopes for consideration tomorrow, if the Alaska delegate bill is disposed of in time.

Railroaders After Better Wages.
Topeka, Jan. 23.—The Kansas City Southern employees at Pittsburg are the latest to take part in the movement among Kansas railroad men for more wages. A demand for an increase has been made and a conference is being held in Pittsburg with the officials of the road. Further efforts were made there today to settle the controversy between the Santa Fe and the conductors and trainmen, but no result was reached. Rumors are yet current here that the Santa Fe telegraphers will ask for more wages.

To Open Alaska Coal Land.
Washington, Jan. 23.—The house public lands committee today authorized Chairman Lacey to draft a bill providing for the entry of unsurveyed coal lands in Alaska by allowing entries to be made of 320-acre tracts, but only in rectangular form, twice as long as wide, and further providing that such entries shall be clearly marked when made, and be privately surveyed prior to submitting final proof. The coal land laws now extended to Alaska are practically inoperative, as the lands are unsurveyed.
