EDITORIAL.

He ran over a horse with a tin can tied to his tail and the horse took fright and tore off up the street, knocking down a lady carrying a basket of milk with a buggy and broke her neck at the corner of Fifth street and doing other great damage besides spilling the milk which was not stopped until the mill was reached owned by Mr. Jones who was killed while walking down the street by a stroke of lightning with a fence rail on his shoulder so far back that a few of the oldest inhabitants knew of the sad occurrence residing in our town."—Milton Eagle.

Ex-Governor T. T. Geer will go to Missouri to represent the Lewis and Clark Expedition. The Governor's high station and his aptitude for ready speaking will no doubt make him a conspicuous figure.

Among the acts of the fifty-seventh congress which were adopted at this session are following: Authorizing the construction of the Ishpanian canal providing civil government in the Philippines extending the Chinese exclusion law; repealing war tax creating a permanent excise tax on providing a system of irrigation for arid lands in the west.

No More Toll.

At 5 o'clock on the evening March the 5th the county court voted to assume charge of the Albany street bridge, accepting the proposition of the city, which will continue to assume the debt of the bridge, but is relieved of all expense of keeping it up. The first toll was collected on the 6th of May, 1901, and the last was paid by H. L. Leach, a restaurant man of Portland, at 7:15 o'clock, he having come up on the local and immediately started across the river to visit relatives when Mayor Davis and Recorder Van Winkle arrived. The Mayor offered the last payer of toll 50 cents for his return check but it was refused, and the check was endorsed by the Mayor, Recorder and W. C. Brockenkamp, the collector, as the last one issued. Hurrah. The action of the county court will be endorsed by the people of the county generally with few exceptions, and by them when they understand more fully the situation.
