Progress on T. W. Dilly's addition to his bicycle store and shop was somewhat hindered last week by a complaint that the proposed improvement did not come within the requirements of ordinances relating to construction within the fire limits. The improvements as well as portions of the old structure were to be covered with corrugated iron. This in the opinion of some, is not "fire proof" within the meaning of the ordinance, although heretofore no legal objection has been made to the construction of this class of buildings within the fire limits. Such structures are not in fact fireproof. The objection to Mr. Dilly's building was made with the view of drawing the line so as to shut out the corrugated iron building in future from fire limits. The question is open, however, as under certain restrictions Mr. Dilly has been allowed to proceed with his work under the assumption that it is in the nature of repairing—Corvallis Times.

About \$150 is likely to be raised, and the city council will also be asked to help, and together will print a pamphlet which will be a credit to Scio and surrounding country, and which will be the means of bringing to this place a number of homeseekers, thereby benefitting every business man and land holder in this section.

Obituary.

John T. Ivy was born in North Carolina March 22, 1848, died in Scio Oregon March 17, 1903, lacking only five days of being 55 years of age.

His parents died when he was but six months old. He was then taken into the family of an uncle near Jacksonville, Florida, where he lived until 1868. Thinking it proper at this age to begin doing for himself he went to New Orleans and secured a position driving a government freight team to San Antonio and Roma Vista, Texas, until 1848. He then rode on a cattle range on, in the trouble with Mexico, when he enlisted and served about two years. From there he went north into Missouri, and finding a contract with a gentleman to drive a team across the plains, starting in Oregon in the fall of 1862, having been about six months on the road sharing the hardships and dangers to which the early settlers were subject. In 1866 he was married to Mrs. Nancy Smith, whose maiden name was Earl. They immediately moved to Linn county where he has resided ever since except from 1885 to 1890 when they resided in eastern Washington. In 1890 Mrs. Ivy came to the Valley on account of ill health, and where she died on January 4, 1891, at the home of her sister, Mrs. Ellen Vaughn, of near Jefferson. From that time Mr. Ivy made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Abbie E. Shore, of Scio. On the 3rd of January he suffered a stroke of paralysis, followed by another stroke on the 2nd of March, from which time he gradually grew worse until death claimed him at 7:30 p. m., on March 17. Two of his sons, C. E. and J. F. Ivy, were to see him during his sickness but had returned home. C. E. Ivy arrived in time to attend the funeral services. Every thing possible for his relief was done, but to no avail. Interment was made in the Franklin Butte cemetery on March 20, 1903. He leaves one daughter and five sons to mourn the loss of a father, Mrs. S. I. Shore, Messrs. James R. John T., Charles E., George W. and Joseph T. Ivy. Several grandchildren and relatives and a host of friends also mourn his demise. Another landmark has been removed and another rugged pioneer who helped to blaze the path of civilization into this far west, has crossed over into the great beyond, from whence no traveler returneth, may his ashes rest in peace, while we revere the name of the honored dead.
